Dear Friend:

Although I have been much pleased with the results of my efforts to learn what the graduates and ex-students of this school are doing at the present time, there are still quite a number about whom I have not heard. I sent you a blank sometime ago containing some questions about yourself and asked you to answer them and return the blank. I have not yet had an answer from you.

I am sending you another blank and ask that you fill this out promptly and return it to me in the envelope enclosed which requires no postage. If you do not care to answer all the questions, please answer as many as you wish and return the blank.

So often in this work, I am asked what statistics can be given to show the result of our efforts to educate the Indian. It is my aim to have on record in this office, letters and statements from all the graduates and ex-students of this school so that all doubting ones may see for themselves what Carlisle has done for the Indian.

It is not necessary that this blank which I am sending to you, show that you stand away above all others in the work you have done; it need not show that you live in a beautiful home; it need not show that you own a great deal of property and that you have great wealth.

If your paper shows that you are working and earning a comfortable and honest living for yourself and family, that is all I want. This is all that is expected of any man, Indian or white.

I will be glad to send you copies of our school papers as soon as I make sure of your correct address through your answer to this letter.
