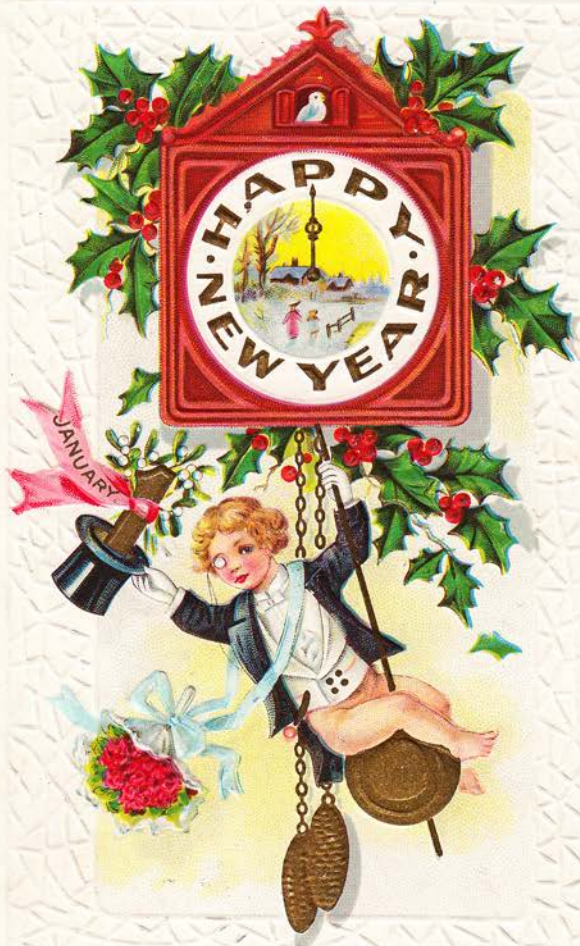

I thought of writing
to you Mr. Friedman because I always
think of dear Carlisle, what it has done
for me while I was at the school.
I'm making practical use of the knowledge
gained while under the Outing System,
don't doing the farming now, while my
father is ill. He is on the way to recovery
now.

We are having fine weather
now, last week I plowed every day.
We are going to put large crops of oats this
spring. Every farmer is plowing for
oats now.

The Easter Sunday is here, and
it's pretty cold too, because there's some snow
on the ground.

I guess the boys & girls had a fine time on Easter Sunday.

I often wished I was at the Commencement week, but probably next time. I have visit Carlisle some time. Because it has done me good while I ~~spend~~ my five years there. I could stay there another term if I could. I'm thankful that I did go to Carlisle.

I'm trying to live up to the principles of "Old Carlisle," as ~~best~~ as I can. I think it will discourage Carlisle the way the two boys are doing, that just came from the finest of United States. Every time they come back from town. They are intoxicated I guess that's what they gained while at Carlisle. I think they ought to go and stay at Carlisle till they have learned better than to be intoxicated nearly every week.

I hope I'll never be like them
boys. I'm trying ~~not~~ to be like that for ever.
