## SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.



## **INDORSEMENTS.**

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

In the beginning of this school term, I wrote you a letter concerning my standing in class at Carlisle. You wrote and said that I had to write later, because you were very busy and could not consider the matter at that time.

I have been attending the same public school for five successful winters and have progressed rapidly



in each study as my averages  
have shown at the close of each  
year. I think I have finished  
all the studies required in the  
senior class at Carlisle. I am now  
in Algebra which I will finish in  
a month and take up Geometry.  
Also in Latin Caesar which I have  
no difficulty in translating Caesar's  
campaigns. I find it rather easy  
to understand German when our  
teacher reads German to us. Besides  
my Algebra, German, Latin, Rhetoric  
Literature, I have Drawing, Singing  
and Manual Training.

Miss Gaither in her last  
visit here gave me an understanding  
of one academic rule which  
requires all students who grad-  
uate at Carlisle to spend their  
senior year there. But since I  
wish to complete my classical  
here, which will give me only two  
years in a normal, I prefer to remain  
here until I have finished the High School

If I am not permitted  
to graduate this year, I

Dear friend:-

I have your letter of recent date concerning your school studies and asking if you can graduate with the present Senior class, this coming Spring. According to your statement, you are far in advance of what our present class is doing and you feel that you are entitled thereby to a Carlisle diploma.

You have asked my advise and I give you what I consider is for your best interests. It is this: stay with your present work, continue your studies where you are, try to keep up your splendid school record and let your aim be to get a Normal School diploma.

One of our Oklahoma girls, Nellie Cox, was this year graduated from the Bloomsburg State Normal School and is now teaching in Porto Rico, having secured, as far as I am able to learn, a very good place there. Nellie had no Carlisle diploma. Hastings Robertson, a Sioux, another of our ex-students, was graduated from the Dickinson Law School about a year ago and is now doing well in the west. He had no Carlisle diploma. I could give you several instances of this kind where a diploma from another institution than Carlisle meant so much more to the



Pickard-2

one receiving it. While I understand your feeling about not receiving a diploma after having spent several years at Carlisle, I do not think you should allow your eagerness for one to interfere in any way with your obtaining one from a higher institution. I trust that you may look at this matter in the right light and not allow anything to interfere with your present studies.

Referring to the other matter in your letter, I have to say that if your time is up this coming June, I know of no reason now why you cannot go to your home for your summer vacation. I think it will be all right for you to return to the school about the middle of June.

I enclose a check for \$15 from your account to be used to purchase clothing for yourself. You have in bank now \$240.21.
