



I have been looking over your little paper which is called The Arrow which I am always glad to receive, looking over some of them I find several of our boys, has been hurt badly which some day will come out on them as they grow older, it will be a damage to them not only our boys but our white brothers I am sorry to say its too bad to waiste strength that way God Created us and given us strength,

but I know he does not
want us to abuse our strenght
That way when our boys go into
a game its battle for life, so
I do hope some day God will
open the eyes of people that
its is wrong to have the
body hurt, which God has
given us, strenght but not
to have it destroyed that way
struggling for a foot ball
There are other ways we can
use our strenght that is come
out and stand boldly for Jesus
I wish more of us could see

it that way, as I read other
papers see where some poor
boy has been carried of the
field hurt so bad that they
never come to I do pray and
hope that the boys will think
this matter over and ~~and~~ ask
God to help them ~~look~~ think
this matter over, God has helped
open my eyes and has helped me

and different in a man when
he gets converted Thank God I
