### INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Carlisle Indian School,

Mr. M. Friedman, Superintendent:

I have consulted the head of Conway Hall where Leo White attended school last year and Professor Hutchison seems to think that White did not take advantage of his chance in attending that institution but manifested an indifferent attitude toward his class work. His deportment was good but his attendance was somewhat irregular and Mr. Hutchison says that he does not compare favorably with the other Indian boys such as Welsh, Long, Broker or Eastman in his school activities.

About the quarters I have found his deportment good and his general conduct is good. I have no knowledge of his other work other than I have stated. I believe that a thorough understanding as to the interest he is expected to put into his school and impressing him with the fact that if he does not wake up to the good chance extended him by this school that he will be sent home that he will do good work the coming year. He ran away from school here last year.

My dear Mr. Spear:

Replying to your letter of August the 19th, I will state that Leo White should not be detailed as an escort to a party of students for Carlisle. He left here without permission and I have written him that I do not desire his return. The Office has ruled that an escort will only be provided for a mixed party of good size, and I am confident you will agree that an employee, or reliable and mature Indian, should act as escort. If the parties come separately possibly they can come alone.

It is hoped, therefore, that a sufficient number can be secured to justify you in bringing the party yourself or in arranging for one of your employees to bring the party.

I am sending you additional blanks and shall be glad to have them submitted to me. Transportation for an unlimited number is being placed to your credit and I hope, through your cooperation, a large number of Omahas and Win-


