SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

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Dear Superintendent:

The following is my report upon Francis Pambrum, a student of this school, and a deserter:

Francis was found working in the R.R. Shops of Altoona Pa., and came back with me only by compulsion and did not seem one bit penitent for his actions. He seems to feel that he is the injured party, and his whole mind is set upon the idea that Carliste can do him no good; that he can do so much better when free from the school; that he can never be contented at Carlisle etc. etc.

Francis does not express any personal grievance against anyone, but assured me that he could not be kept here unless under guard all the while; that he would run away as often as brought back etc.

I turned him over to the Disciplinarian and the following is his report.:

Mr. Dickey, Outing Agent:

I find that Francis Pambrum will not remain at the school unless kept constantly in the guard House and that when he is released he will again run away. I have had some talk with him and asked him if there was any way that he would stay his term of enrollment with the Carlisle School as a regular student and not be classed as a cronic runaway ; he finally agreed if permitted, to return under the Outing management for the balance of his term here and abide with all the rules of the Outing. Mr. Pensyl with whom he has been before is willing to take him back to work at his trade and that he will keep him strictly under the Outing rules. Heh has been with this man before and I believe that everything was all right. All this Mr. Pensyl told over the 'Phone today and on account of the entire circumstances connected with this case as well as doing the best for the boy and converting him from a runaway into a good trade student I would advise that he be placed at once under the Outing with Mr. Pensyl. I have put Francis upon his honor to await the action in his case and since he expresses willingness to return to the Outing and has pledged himself to remain at school till I notify him of the final disposition of his case I have not placed him in the Guard House.
