To the Carlisle Arrow.

Dear Sir:

I never write and reports myself since I returned from Carlisle for this a great reason, I did not report, because they all know me, what I am doing here, among the Sioux tribes. I try to give a good example, among our people, I always living by hard labor, that way, everything, plenty to eat, both my horses plenty eat, have no trouble anythings I need to have, easy therefore. There is no excellent without a great labor, even if we sold some our lands, land money fool with it, when draw monthly checks from Rockwell Indian agency office, both old & young, those who are sold their lands, and the money all goes no profit lately just before Christmas. Even two of young men shot each others, one of Ep students of Carlisle is Raymond Stewart, and

charge charging Howk, George is
 died and Raymond Stewart is still
 living yet, I am honest and facts
 to tell is the truth, every thing go so
 Crooked among Rockbud Reservation,
 Whiskey is leader, the government
 ought know us very well about
 this time if he wants all the Indians
 be come the Citizens hip of the U.S.
 ought give us the right Strong man
 to look after this reservation, also making
 there school boys very strictly, not permitted
 Indian dances, any more, when I first came
 back from Carlisle, I followed my trade as Harness
 Maker, at Rockbud Agency, S.D. for eight years,
 and two year farming on my Ranch, and again
 two years I am clerking in Store, at St
 Francis Mission, I think this help me more better
 than two others before; I expect to stay a little
 longer in this Store yet, Excuse me

1787 THE ROSEBUD FAIR. 1912

Although the weather was not very favorable, a very successful fair was held at Rosebud Agency on September 24, 25, and 26th.

The exhibits, all grown by Indians on the reservation, consisted of corn, tomatoes, squashes, pumpkins, potatoes, cabbage, wheat, oats, peanuts, and beets.

Henry Horse Looking, an old Carlisle student, had on exhibition samples of wheat and oats raised on his allotment and said to be the first raised by Rosebud Indians. Among the successful exhibitors were Irons the Fire, Neck Shield, Little Chief, Crazy Boy, Henry Horse Looking, Quick Bear, Walks in the Woods, and Thunder. Superintendent Scriven and his coworkers deserve a great deal of credit for the success of the exhibition.

We had very severe winter
still snowed yet, this is
March 22^d 1915; about more
than 4 ft deep snow, and
pretty hard on both horses &
