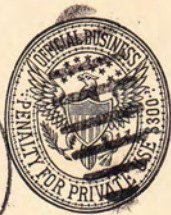
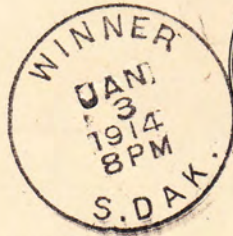

12. Tell me anything else of interest connected with your life. My wish and hope was to learn to know how to make my living when I entered Carlisle. I was a young boy when I first went there as I had to work hard to learn when I know now I was always willing to work when I had the chance. After I came home depending on the promise made to the Carlisle students for government position. I have applied several times but it seems that the students of these reservations have been forgotten or neglected either for their own fault or what I do not know, but never being able to get a solid position from the government I have with the aid of what I learned at Carlisle made my way through this life with a family of a wife & two children to support which I never could if I did not hold on to what Carlisle school has taught me. It seems I can't thank the school enough & I still hope for employment from the government as carpenter which was my trade.

If you can find earnest boys and girls who desire to come to Carlisle I would thank you to give them such assistance as is required to bring their applications to the Supervisor's attention or to let me know in what way I can co-operate further.

If a party of sufficient numbers can be secured for enrolment at Carlisle an escort's expenses will be provided for. If Supervisor Davis cannot spare some one to accompany students to Carlisle it can be arranged to send an escort from Carlisle to bring the party.
