Dear Mr. Freeman
I was in school today
about the school building
I was taken in Carlisle
Indian School October 6th
1879 and was not talk
any English when I was
in school that time also
all the Sioux Boys & girls
I think it is pretty hard
for us that day like English
language but after a year or two
we can use little of it as
we can read & write
and learn how to work
all kinds of trade not all
but a few with the boys &
girls and they thought
they know more than any
of but there are so many

things further ahead but
we did it. Now we think
we are. Learned enough
to left, learned that time
but we are not, if we
stay a more than five years
we could use English
right but we want come
home and stay with our
our tribe. I believe this time
year all these young people
would stay long as they
wanted. Lots large things
to learn or study for of
course I am not graduate
but I could use little
English all the time so
I could talk any place
I work my trade and have

some matter with me.
I became my trade in
school so I stick to never
give up so if the boys
who are learned how
to painting he must
stick to give hold long
as he makes money at
and then he will get
long now see the time.
I leave the school a year
1889 of the July when he
work the my trade since
so I will paint some
better than white painting.
So these boys learn the
trade must learn and
until their return home.
I see you do me & mine

that I painting myself. I
 am picture taking with
 my boy + girl and grand-
 daughter with her child.
 I just started for last year
 ago. I just receive letter
 from Alumni Association
 Saturday and make
 me think that someone
 like to come to see the
 school and also the boys
 but as I read that I can
 not help us to come if
 that Association think
 help some way to come
 to school this cause
 me way. I like come my-
 self but cost too much rail
 road fair. I only think me

to come see what they
are talking about that
is America Indian Association

I wish I could say more if
I have time.
