## SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

*NOTE.*—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

## INDORSEMENTS.

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The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

My dear Mr. Friedman:

Just a few lines to let you know that I am very sorry for the things I have done, but Mr. Friedman, I really didn't think it was anything to walk down the way I have done. I have heard that the people are talking about me going down that way and meeting colored boys. Well Mr. Friedman I did. I have gone that way but about meeting the colored boys and talking to them I did not. The way I got to know their names was from our wash-woman. One of the boys came here one time ~~and so I~~ and so I asked her what his name was, she told me. The next Sunday we went up the street again and I saw another light colored boy, so the next time she came I told her about it and then she told me his name. And that is the way I knew their names. Miss Gaither was here this morning, but am sorry to say I have not told her the exact things as I wanted to. And another thing Mr. Friedman, Lillian Rice has told Miss Gaither that she was late so many times because she waited for me. Now Mr. Friedman every time I'm late I have to take an excuse and Lillian don't. One time she was late because we changed shoes on the way to school and she turned back



but I wasn't late for I went on. Now every time she was late  
it wasn't because she waited for me. I think she has put too  
much on me. If you will let me stay out till spring, I'll  
promise not to go out the way I have done and from now on will  
leave her alone. I am indeed very sorry to write you such a  
letter as this, but I don't like to be in trouble, and will try

Dear Sir:

While in moorestown I visited the girls in that place and, much to my regret, will tell you of conditions there.

Through Mrs. R. E. Love, who has Lillian Rice, I learned that Lillian and Eva Flood, who is with Mrs. J. S. Buist, attended the same school. As both girls live about one mile from the school, they have been allowed to take their luncheon and not return home during the noon hour. Many of the white girls and teachers take their luncheon and do not go home. If the students wish to leave the grounds during the noon hour, they must get permission from the teachers.

Mrs. Love found out through some one that Lillian and Eva had been slipping out during the noon hour without asking permission and going to the negro section of the town, there meeting two negro boys by the name of Charles and Sam Westley. Both girls have acknowledged that they have gone down through the negro section and have talked to the negro boys, but state that they have never entered any negro house. I could not find that they had done so.



Both Mrs. Buist and Mrs. Love have been very much annoyed and have stopped the girls visiting and are keeping close watch on them. Mrs. Buist says that Lillian has always had a bad influence over Eva; that before Lillian came there last August she had no trouble with Eva, and that Eva rarely ever wanted to leave the house.

Mrs. Love also found that twice when she sent Lillian to church on Sunday, she went visiting a neighbor and did not go to church.

I do not think any blame could be put upon either patron. Mrs. Buist is a new patron, and Eva has improved very much under her training. Mrs. R. E. Love is one of the best and most watchful patrons we have.

I took the girls from school, which I find they have been attending very regularly, and told both patrons not to permit them to visit or return to school until they heard from you. It is my judgment that they should be transferred at once.

I have your letter about Manual Hidalgo, and will go on Monday to Kennett Square, Pa., to see him and make a report to you.

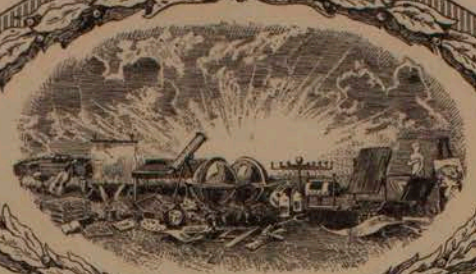
