Saturday night Superintendent Peirce and Mr. Carr accomplished some good work which resulted in the arrest and conviction of George Quim and Lucas Hart two young men from Sisseton Agency. These young fellows in company with three others from Sisseton arrived here during the day and after proceeding to Egan returned with a gallon of whiskey, with which they proceeded to treat friends here among outside Indians and school pupils. The matter was reported at the school office and Messrs Peirce and Car started out to locate the offenders who were soon found in town carrying a small suit case. In the absence of the police at the time no arrest was made, but they were followed to the bridge where they were soon after arrested while in the act of hiding the case in which was found several bottles of liquor. A hearing was given them in Justice Carter's Court Monday morning and in default of one thousand dollar bonds they were placed in jail to await the action of the district Court which convenes about the middle of next month. Three other members of the party escaped into Minnesota where they are at present beyond the reach of South Dakota officials. It is probable that all will decide that Flandreau is not a safe place at which to practice bootlegging or giving of liquor to minors.

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
