My dear Mr. Ascher:

Replying to your letter of the 1st instant relative to your check No. 7573, dated June 10, 1909, for \$1.68, I have to advise that the evidence shows that this check was mailed to you on June 10, 1909, to close your account but it appears that it has never been cashed. As a consequence of its not having been cashed, we are put to quite a good deal of trouble in reporting it every three months to the office at Washington. We wrote you regarding this check in order to have you cash same if it was still in your possession in order that we would be caused no further trouble in regard thereto.

If this check cannot be found, according to Government rules it will be necessary for you to give a bond for twice the amount of the check in order to protect the Government in case the check is ever cashed.

Please look the matter up further and if you can find the check, I would thank you to cash same or return it to us and we will mail you its equivalent in postage or cash in order that you may not be put to any expense of having the bank collect same.
