Referring to your favor of recent date, with which you forwarded to this school James Browndog's mutilated certificate that was given to him here in 1907, you are advised that it was believed best to preserve what is left of the original. The signatures of Messrs. Mercer, Wise and Thompson could probably have been secured on a duplicate, but Miss Ely, whose signature also appears on the certificate, died less than a year ago.

Therefore, the liberty has been taken to paste what is left of the original on a copy of a similar certificate and for all intents and purposes it is as good as ever. In fact, it should be of more sentimental value to Mr. Browndog than a duplicate could have been made.

The repaired certificate is being forwarded to you under a separate cover and I would thank you to hand it to the young man who originally earned it with my compliments.
