I have been home

And soon after came home I took up a
farm work and ever since I am trying
I can not do any else. My education
is not high ~~enough~~ enough My eyes
frequently bother me. I am now having
trouble over year This year I raised
sum little over 2089 stks of wheat
besides that I raised of about 50 tons
of hay I sold this summer 4 cows
at \$156.50 one bull afterwards \$35.50
and about ten days I sold 4, three
years old steers at \$237.78. You can
see what the school can do if the

Dear Sivi —

I thought I would remind the school that I am still alive since came away from school in the year (1894) though I am not accomplishing much, but simply let the school know that I am still alive. The school knew the cause I came away, on account of eyes. And they bother me. I was down to Portland Oregon several times before eye specialist. They help me, but do not have much time to stay down there.

I always remember the
School, though the old employees
may have retired from the
work, But the School is
there. Where I got ~~my~~
mine foot hold of knowledge,
very least. but its good
enough for my business in
this world I am still farming
on rented land. I sold of my
summer fallow the other day
for \$600 (or) (75 acres)
And the man plough it himself
and put ~~and~~ another extra
row on $\frac{1}{4}$ mile, besides.
I have about two ^{or} weeks to
finish my summer fallow
plowing I have just one
eight horse team ploughing
I have one white young man
working at the rate \$35 ^{for} a month

Perhaps you remember
William O. Jones. ~~But~~ he
is still alive, working
for his brother on the
summer fallow plowing.
I am having a goodly crop
of calves this year and beef
cattle will be fat about
two weeks yet. Hoping
the School will remember
who I am. So this short
letter leaves me in good
condition & wife.



Dear Major Swartzlander:

In receipt of your letter and clipping, I tell how my red race have been treated, when 1492, Mr Columbus discovered West Indies he gave credit to his Kingdom of Spain. And some years after ^{wards} Main land was discovered perhaps ^{for} Great Britain Kingdom. The Indians were found there on, on all parts. Only earnest people are told that paid on Manhattan Island, \$24 by dutch people, and William Penn, the Quaker, paid, in beads and perhaps shirts ^{to} ^{the} ^{Indians}. For south-west part of State of Penna, and of our Country was taken by fire of the guns until they were corralled on Reservations. Next you know the Indians are targets to Scheme on how to take land away from them. The clipping you send to me. I never made speech on it. But I had it ⁱⁿ my pocket, which I thought would be better known by common good

people. How the Indians have been
excited by the grafter and speculators
to encourage the Government to act on.
I was making off hand speech
not on the subject was clipped off.

I made suggest that I have paper
in my pocket which ought to
have ^{been} published in some paper
to be known. Rev J. M. Cornelison,
was there all through while I was
making off hand speech. You can
ask him reference to that. And also
write - Supt Lipps. that I did not
make speech on that written report.
