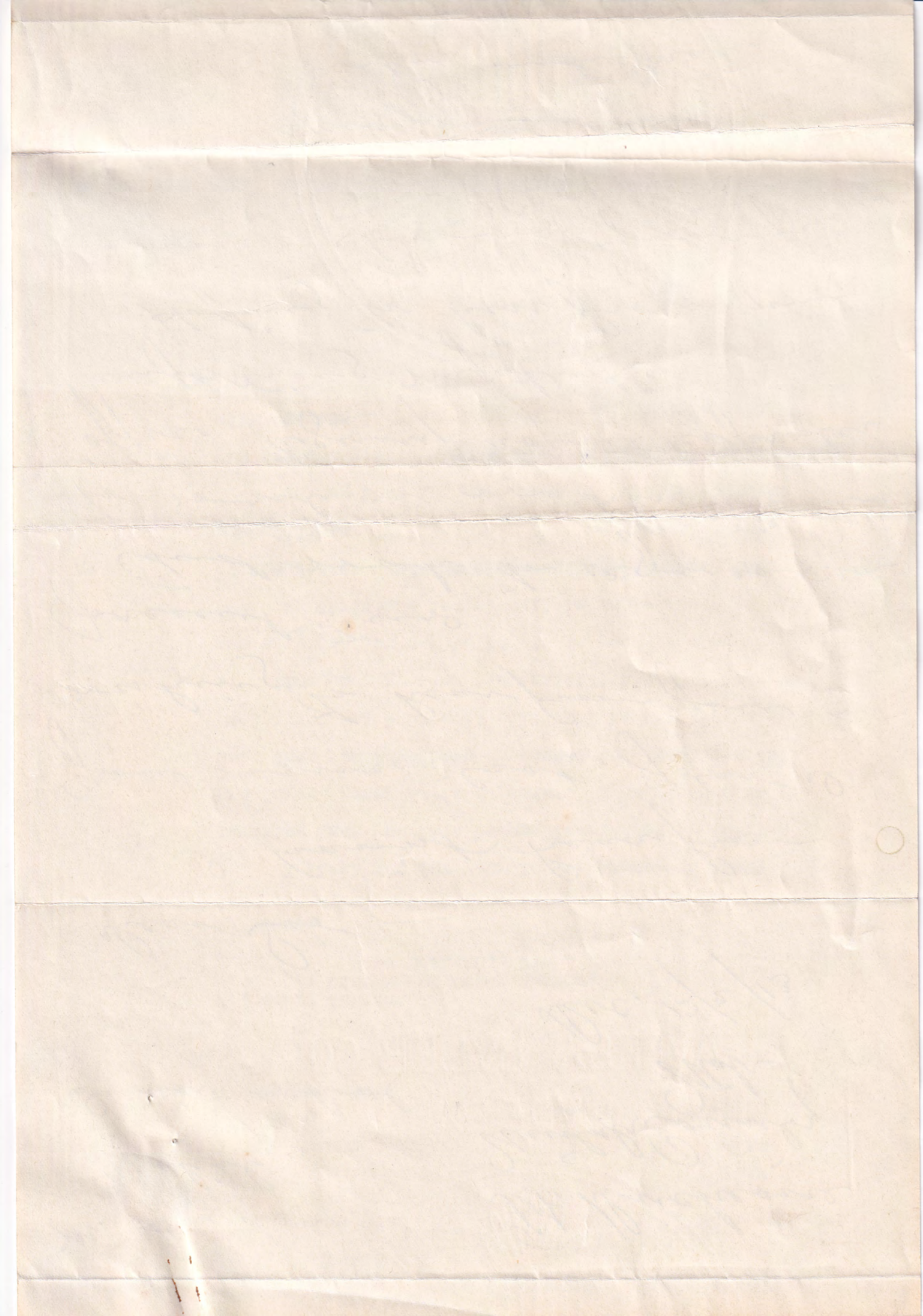

I must also state that it will not be possible to arrange so that you can accompany your brother to Carlisle as escort, unless you pay for your traveling expenses.
