3. Did you attend or graduate from any other schools after leaving Carlisle? no Give names of schools and dates if possible. none

4. What is your present occupation? Farming + Carpenter.

5. Tell something of your present home I live east of Winnemago, nebr. on my wife's allotment. live in sort of a house nothing extra good but comfortable.

6. What property in the way of land, stock, buildings or money do you have? I got very little property. I got my allotment and other hired land and building there on and not much money.

7. Have you been in the Indian Service? In what positions? How long in each? When I came back from Carlisle I was on police force as a cap't. and became a blacksmith interpreter, and interpreter for allotting squat, each positions are three years time, til I got married and made my home.

8. What other positions have you held since leaving Carlisle?..... Once I was elected as a County Commissioner in my county Thurston County, til I refuse to take it.

9. Tell me anything else of interest connected with your life:

I have nothing interest to tellyou, but I am doing my best, to teach my people both young and old and they are learning too about God & Jesus. The people are calling us "mascal eater," for such name. I supposed you hear good deal about it.

Dear Miss Gaithur:

I received your letter and I was very glad to hear from you and the girls, we are all well here at home.

I have no objection, if you wanted to put ^{our picture} it in the "Arrow". and I will give you the brief history of my miserable life.

My mother died while I was yet a baby so my grandmother (my father's mother) raised me on gravy and she also died when I was five years old, then I was kicked here and there in different families, and when I was seven years old my father took me and made me work for him what little I could do, til I was sixteen. The Allotting Agent Miss. Alice Fletcher came, year 1887. and she saw me twice, and both time she said to me, I ought to be school. we talked

through an interpreter, and I told her, I have
tried to go to school, even at Agency school
my father would not let me, and I told
her if she can obtain permission from my
father, I would go any where to school, but she
fail, and I supposed she was very sorry for
me, and next time I saw her, she asked me
if I was still in notion to go to school, and I
told her I was, and asked me if I would run
away from my father, if she got me the ticket
to Carlisle, Pa.? and I told her I would, so she
arrange certain night and certain place to
meet, so we carried out, and I was taken to Ban-
croft, Nbs. Thirty two miles from the Winnelago Ag'ry.

I started to run away from father, Dec. 18th
1888. and I got to Carlisle Dec. 22nd 1888. and in April
24th 1889. I went out in the country. Rushville, Bucks
Co. Pa. and I happen to struck a very mean man to
work for, but I stayed there for two seasons
getting only ten dollars a month, but I worked
just as hard as though I was getting \$40⁰⁰ a month.

And went back to Carlisle Sept 12th 1890.
 and I was out again April 14th 1892 at Bryn
 Maw, Montgomery Co. Pa. at last I worked for very
 kind man and he gave me \$ 35⁰⁰ a month, and
 I only worked there five month and went back
 to Carlisle Sept. 12th 1892. and I stayed til I was
 send back to Nebraska to die, they thought I was con-
 sumped, I left Carlisle, June 15th 1895. I never
 graduate, although I was in the senior class
 for three months, and I learn to be steam-plumber,
 including carpentering and blacksmithing,
 when I came back to Minnebago Agency, I was
 will in side of two month and I was offered
 the position of chief of police and beside I was
 promise a better place later on and gladly accepted
 it, and about two months late I was promoted to
 be the Agency blacksmith, and three years late
 I was promoted again as a Agency interpreter
 and again eighteen months later, I was given
 a better place, I worked with John K. Rankin
 an Allotting Agent.

I worked with him three years and then I was elected as a county commissioner, in our county, (Thurston Co. Neb.) and I serve one term and refuse the second term, and in mean time I got married to Martha Hensley, she never have any schooling because her parents were oppose of schooling, there were five girls and two boys that they never went to a day to school. but she was a good worker.

And then we move on farm of one hundred and sixty acres, near Thurston, Neb.

We now got five healthy children and we are always happy and made good living on farm and independent.

I will now conclude with best wishes to your future welfare.
