and dates if possible. I only attended the Carlisle school, I did not graduate from any other school.4. What is your present occupation? Salary? I am living on my land and working at home I put in a garden and do my house work5. Do you own your home? Yes, I own my home6. What kind of a house is it? Number of rooms? Lumber house frame only two rooms we are going to have a larger house built this winter coming.

7. How much property do you possess?

8. Do you have money in the bank? *no* How much?

9. Have you been in the Indian Service? In what positions? How long in each?

I was sent from Carlisle to Genoa Neb to work in the Indian service then I stayed there 1 year and a half until change of Sept. then I resigned. Came home

10. What other positions have you held since leaving Carlisle? *I have not been in the Indian service any more, have lived at home with my family.*

11. Have you done anything for the betterment of your people? Write fully.

Yes. I have talked to my people and even asked them to send their children to school so they can get an education and help their own people in farming and in doing many useful things on the farm and to live like the good white people, and I think they are doing it this is the Arapahoe tribe I mention I belong to and they are doing well. Some live in houses and others in wall tents and cook on stoves.

but they are having houses built for them with lease money and some are selling their land, I talk to them and say that they can live clean and keep their houses nice and clean and make their own living, and then they could not ~~do~~ have any one say that they did not work, but go ahead. Even if you are Indian.

12. Tell me anything else of interest connected with your life.

I stay at home and take care of my children and do my house work as I was taught at Carlisle and at our summer homes that we stayed at when vacation come while at Carlisle, I remember all and still do the same I do my own baking and cook^{ing} just as I did for the white family I lived with in Pat near Strasburg their name is John Bachman and the man died I heard out I learned a great deal from Mrs Bachman she taught me a great many useful things I still remember and do, I teach my children the same we have a church where we Indians go to church, of Sundays.

I want your help in this attempt. I understand you own a good comfortable home. May I ask that you send me a photograph of your home to be used for the purpose above named. I will appreciate your aid, and will be glad to return the photograph after I have had a cut made from it. Please wrap the photograph well, with the proper backing so it will not be broken in the mail. I will be glad to reimburse you for whatever the photographs cost you.

and I did not pay any thing
for going to school, I am very
thankful, and am willing to do
all I can for my people
and we talk to them often
about how to do, and go a-
head, with work, on their
farms the Indian children
ought to be very thankful.
