1. Are you married and if so to whom? James W Johnston. Chippewa

2. What is your present address? Bay City W.S. Mich. P.O. No. 6.

3. Did you attend or graduate from any other schools after leaving Carlisle? Give names of school and dates if possible. After leaving Carlisle I never attend to any other school. For my health did not permit me to do any studying.

4. What is your present occupation? Salary? My occupation is Dress making - and a house keeper. No salary, only charge on every suit I make.

5. Do you own your home? Yes.

6. What kind of a house is it? Number of rooms? A frame house not a large house. only seven rooms.

7. How much property do you possess?

Stock We have one team of Horses and two Cows and some Pige. &c.

Land 20 acres. all under cultivation and besides we are renting a farm. at present.

8. Do you have money in the bank? ^{not very much} How much? \$500.00 just beginning
9. Have you been in the Indian Service? In what positions? How long in each?

I never was in the Indian Service since returning from Carlisle School.

10. What other positions have you held since leaving Carlisle? I was a school teacher. Taught one term up in Oscoda Mich. My salary was thirty five dollars a month, and also was a music teacher.

11. Have you done anything for the betterment of your people? Write fully.

I have been doing all I can for my people, when ever there is a chance, and have persuading them to allow their children to leave home and to be educated in some of the schools, especially to Carlisle. The school I attend, for I know nearly all those that attend Carlisle, are progressing. I cannot do very much, only to tell them what is good for them and their children, and have taken a party

of children to the school I was at. I hope to continue in doing this giving advice to my people for the betterment of the Indian children. There are not very many students around here that I would mention. My brother L. M. Cloud is doing pretty well he follows all what Carlisle has done for him. He is a Band leader in the City and is also farming in our father's farm, is doing well.

12. Tell me anything else of interest connected with your life.

It is quite difficult to tell about my life since I left Carlisle. I never look or took a back seat of any thing I always hold my head up and look forward. Every thing comes easy with me. My work has been doing good among every body both among the Whites and the Indians. before I was married I lived at home and helped my parents along. I never know what idle is. always lots of work ahead of me. After I was married I went to house keeping. My husband is a Chippewa and education fair. He is a Graduate for Fireman and Brake man, and is a Farmer. I have two children Ira & Wallace. Ira ^{now} ~~not~~ attending Carlisle School.

My dear friend:

I wish to tell
you something about my boy
Ora. Since he went out in the
country he has written to me
once. And that is his home-
letter. I am not satisfied
the way he is working for those
people. When you wrote to me

you told me he was to work
with the lady. to do light
work around the house for the
lady, such as bringing in wood
and feeding the chickens and
do little of garden work, but
I see it is all different. he is
not saving the lady's steps, but he
is doing this to the man. He takes
care of the horses & mules and
milks morning and evening, and
he drives the mules and rakes
the ground and so on. This
is not the understanding I received
from you. Now I wish to have this
stop. he is only a child. not a
young man. he is working too
hard, worst of all I do not allow

to have any thing to do with Horses
and Mules. for there is no telling
when the mules might kick. He
is too young to do such work.
When you told me what work he was
to do when he got there, that is all.
that got me to let him go in
the Country. He claims to like
the place all right. it is the work
that he has to do, I do not like.
How much does he receive a
Month? by doing such work. Now
dear friend. I want you to do a favor
for me. To stop minding the Horses
and Mules. and also Milking the
cows he cannot stand the work.
I am so sorry I allow him to go out.
Please tell me the name of the

people he is working for; when
he wrote to me, he did not tell
me. I would be very glad to
know, this is all at present.

He tells me in his letter what he is doing every day taking care of Horses and Mules and also the cattle. He is too young to do all this.

Now I want you to see, that he does not do such work, above all things, I object, that he must not have any thing to do with Horses and Mules. I am very much alarmed about this. It is the reason why I write to you, to see about him. If I had known how he is, I would not allow him to go out.

I have been wanting
to write to you, ever since, I
received the invitation for the
Commencement. was very sorry
I could not attend, but my
mind was there, wishing you
and the students a success.
I see that my boy Ira is again
out in the country. I hope he

will do well, and keep up his report. I wrote to him, and told him to write to me soon, but no answer. I suppose he waits until he writes a home letter.

Mr George James was here the other day wishing me to write to you about his daughter Martha James. He wrote to you once asking you to let Martha come home. They have heard at different times, that Martha was in the Hospital sick for a long time. That was the reason he wrote you a letter. He said he would be very glad, that his daughter would finish

her five years. It was Lucy and Agnes Stevens that makes those reports on Martha. I told Mr James you was the one that would say something about it, I have told them how they are taken care of, when the students are sick. When Mr Sownick was nearly killed, I heard they wrote to you to let David Sownick, his son to come home, and do the work. I was very sorry, for they have no reason to call him home. There is enough of them to do the work. If they send money, I advise you not to let him. He is better off where he is. Let him complete his term.

We are all doing well so far
with our work. My brother
Malpass Cloud is working on
father's farm, buisy putting
the Crops in. Agnes Cabay
has gone to Mt Pleasant Indian
School, has taken a position
as boys Matron. She likes
her work. I have been very
buisy doing dressmaking, from
the City Country, also.

Mrs. Brandt says; he does not like to do house work, but prefers the outside work, and had been allowed to do some of this kind of work a few times. Boylike he brags about this kind of work in his home letter, and gives you the impression that this was all he did.
