

I am inclosing check No. 2813, drawn against the account of Emma Newashe in the sum of \$300, and approved by the Superintendent of Sac and Fox Indian School. This amount is for the purpose of purchasing a lot that will, it seems, materially increase the value of the property of her brother, William Newashe.

I have given this case careful consideration and it was taken up with William and his sister while in the Office on October 8th. Inasmuch as the purchase, if made, will inure to William's benefit, I believe the title should be taken in his name, and he agrees to reimburse his sister's account at the rate of \$100 a year from lease accruals derived from his allotment, under the jurisdiction of the Superintendent of Sac and Fox Indian School, for the amount advanced. You are therefore directed to draw up a satisfactory agreement, and have William sign the same, the provisions of which are to obligate him to reimburse his sister and authorize you to transfer from his account to the credit of Emma, under supervision, \$100 a year, at such

times and in such amounts as may be satisfactory to the parties concerned. The Superintendent of Sac and Fox Indian School has this day been directed, by telegraph, to transfer to you all individual Indian funds now on deposit, under his jurisdiction, to the credit of William Newashe. He is further directed to transfer to your jurisdiction all funds that may accrue to William's credit in the future.

After Emma signs the check, you should see that the money is expended only for the purpose for which it is authorized, and you will assist the grantee in procuring a good title to the lot.

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.




Newashee, Carlisle Indian.

In response to a telegram from Inspector Linnen of even date herewith, I am enclosing the check in question. It was returned to me by Supt. Friedman and I had it in the mail to send to the Indian Office with a request that the Office would make proper disposition of it. For your information I enclose a copy of the letter I had written the Office but which it is now unnecessary for me to send.

In this conection your attention is invited to the fact that Mr. Nawashe has had something like six thousand dollars during the past two years some of which, if not much, has been spent in riotous living. My understanding is that of this amount he he has left only an equity in his Paxtang property theuvalue of which is something less than three thousand dollars. He has also used up all he has earned in that time. I do not know how much that is but I do know that during 1912 he was playing Professional Base Ball and had a good salary. Last Fall he and his wife spent several weeks in Oklahoma City living at one of the best hotels in the city. He received a Patent in Fee for one half of his allotment last summer and he now has a mortgage against that of \$1495.00, just about all it is worth.

I have not endeavored to learn the facts in the case, but it appears that Newashe's wife has helped to support him. She is now in desperate circumstances and planning to have the State of Pennsylvania assume the responsibility
