INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

In response to a telegram from Inspector Linnen of even date herewith, I am enclosing the check in question. It was returned to me by Supt. Friedman and I had it in the mail to send to the Indian Office with a request that the Office would make proper disposition of it. For your information I enclose a copy of the letter I had written the Office but which it is now unnecessary for me to send.

In this connection your attention is invited to the fact that Mr. Nawashe has had something like six thousand dollars during the past two years some of which, if not much, has been spent in riotous living. My understanding is that of this amount he has left only an equity in his Paxtang property the value of which is something less than three thousand dollars. He has also used up all he has earned in that time. I do not know how much that is but I do know that during 1912 he was playing Professional Base Ball and had a good salary. Last Fall he and his wife spent several weeks in Oklahoma City living at one of the best hotels in the city. He received a Patent in Fee for one half of his allotment last summer and he now has a mortgage against that of \$1495.00, just about all it is worth.

Your letter of the 18th instant in regard to William Newashe and his wife came to me at noon today, and I now return to you herewith the communication from the latter as you requested.

Only yesterday I had letters from both of them. Newashe desires to come from Detroit, Michigan, to Carlisle to visit his wife if money he expects you to send to this school can be used to provide a ticket for him. I wrote him that you had not forwarded any money here for his use and to the wife that I should certainly not be in favor of helping to bring him here for any purpose whatsoever if he has gotten so low down as to sell her winter clothing with which to continue with his dissipation.

I have not endeavored to learn the facts in the case, but it appears that Newashe's wife has helped to support him. She is now in desperate circumstances and planning to have the State of Pennsylvania assume the responsibility

I do not want to have anything at all to do with the disbursing of Newashe's money unless you believe it advisable to have him contribute to his wife's support.
