Dear Mr. Dunlevy:

I regret very much that this reply to your inquiry about Manuel Hidalgo's progress has been so long delayed. When your communication was received Manuel was located at Kennett Square and it took some time before definite information could be secured.

Thru the failure of Manuel's employer to cooperate with us as fully as he should have done Manuel attended school very irregularly while at Kennett Square, and as soon as such information was conveyed to me I gave instructions to have him brought back here. As this was also in accordance with Manuel's desire he has now been at his studies here for several weeks, and the verbal reports that have come to me from his teachers and from our Principal Teacher are most favorable. Manuel has been hard to handle several different times since he came here, but he is bright and ambitious and I am pleased to say that he seems to be a better and more industrious boy now than he has been at any time since he came here.

He is now enrolled in the class here known as Seventh Grade ending, so that if he passes in his examinations he

will take up Eighth Grade work right after our Commencement in April. Manuel has made more rapid progress in the past than some of his classmates, and has been promoted in the middle of the school year, so that if he continues to do as well as he has been doing since his return to school last month he should complete Eighth Grade work next year.

While at Kennett Square he devoted all his time out of school to practical work in a small printing plant, where both job and newspaper work was done. He will have a chance to take up his work in our print shop at the beginning of next month, so if he applies himself as closely as he did during his former stay in the print shop he will soon have quite an extensive knowledge of the printer's trade.

Now that he is back again in school his monthly report cards will be mailed to you regularly.

If I can give you any other information I will be more prompt with my reply when I hear what is desired.
