My dear Madam:-

I have your letter of October twenty-first, and note that you have two very young children whom you desire to enroll at Carlisle. I regret exceedingly that we cannot enroll them, because of their age. We are not enrolling students under fourteen years of age nor beyond the age of twenty. These young people must be eligible in every way from a standpoint of health and purposefulness.

I believe that it would be well for you to send these young children to one of the Indian schools near by. There are several boarding schools near your home, and it may be that you can arrange for them to be enrolled in one of these schools, at least I hope so. If there is anything that I can do for you at any time, do not hesitate to write to me.
