Sometime ago I received your letter with the invitation to the Commencement Exercises which are to be held the last of March and the first part of April. I am very sorry I cannot come but circumstances are not in the condition that I may.

I have longed for many years to again see the place where I spent so many happy, listless years; those too happy to realize the many sides of this world. True the time is well spent, by no matter whom, at these days. I hope that in the future I too shall be able to come there, once again to that "dear old home". Then it was mine, and orphan's home.

I have lived in town all my married life and have four children in the public schools. The oldest is almost thru high school while the youngest are in the lower grades

of the common school.

The second oldest, a girl of thirteen, has been thinking of coming to your school this coming fall. She might come, if she does not change her mind. The sole reason for coming there is to be taught music, arts gymnastics and almost anything even more so in these than in books altho she is just as intelligent in them too. She does not speak a word of the Indian language therefore she is an exceptionally good English speaker and is next to her last year in the common school.

If you have any children coming from the Oneida Reservation to there let us know so she may go with them. We are only ten miles from there. You will let us know how long she is to stay and all other needy information, sometime before the close of school in June. Then we can be more able to decide.

If it isn't any expense for you could you
send me a program of the Commencement.

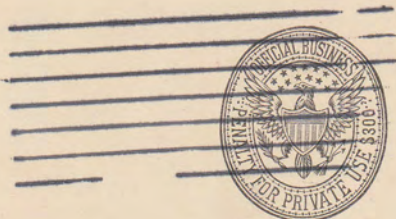
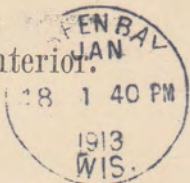
