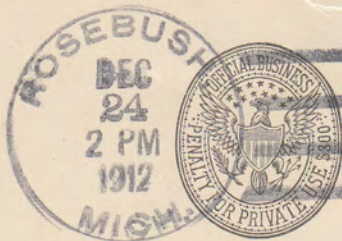

Mr. M. Friedman:

I have in hand your letter of Sept. 4th. I am very much disappointed, and the children are. Mr. Friedman you do not believe my words I see that plainly. I want you to ask Mr. Cochran of the Mt. Pleasant School the last paper I signed when my girl Georgina was enrolled the second time. If he made complained of my children going to Carlisle he has no business whatever concerning the children, he can not hold them for I went and explained every thing to the lawyer and he says he can not if he has not papers to show. My girl has been to the Mt. Pleasant School for 9 years and only in the 4th grade and I am ashamed of her and he tells me she is one of the smartest scholars he had there why is it she is not any farther advanced than that. I do not know why I have failed this is the 3rd time I have tried to send my girl out there and I am going to send a letter to Washington to the Comm. of Indian Affairs. I want my children to learn something that will help them along in this world. And as far as my boy I did not sign any papers when I took him to this same school and of course Cochran could not hold him there. The only rreason why Cochran is kicking is because he has no use of Carlisle Indian School he does not like to have pupils

from here go out there. And another thing you have taken
8th grade graduates in Carlisle and I don't understand why
my children can not enroll and I am sure they have more
right there and great many others for I am an exstudent of Car-
lisle and I have right to place my children there, now as
soon as Cochran is back I am going to see him. I will make
trouble if my wish fails.

Dear Sir:

I am in receipt of carbon copies of letters written to Mrs. Rose Collins, Rosebush, Mich., relative to the enrolment of her children, Samuel and Georgiana, in the Carlisle school, and Benj. P. Ettawegejig, Harbor Springs, Mich., relative to the enrolment of his son, Lacey, in your school.

In reply to same I have to say that Samuel Collins was returned to his home last fall from this school at the request of his parents, who stated they lived only a short distance from the public schools and were able to send the boy to the public school; that Georgiana Collins has been a pupil of the Mt. Pleasant school for a number of years and has not completed her grades here and therefore is not eligible for entrance in the Carlisle school.

In regard to Lacey Ettawegejig, I have to report that he was returned to his home on account of ill health due to approaching symptoms of tuberculosis.

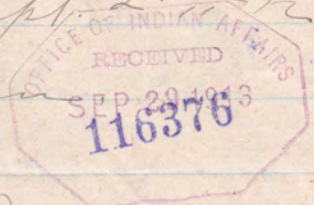

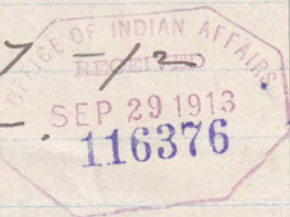

I have noted in your letter of August the 25th that Mrs. Ermatinger of Walpole Island has brought several children to your home and that you are to keep them while they wait for transportation to be placed for their coming to Carlisle. In reply I must state that applications to cover the enrolment have not been submitted me, and until I have had a chance to consider such applications I cannot place transportation.

The blanks I enclose herewith should be carefully filled out in every detail. The set marked "1" is to be used if the children are members of a Michigan Tribe. If they are members of a tribe under the jurisdiction of an Agency Superintendent the blanks marked "2" must be used and only after they have been approved by that Superintendent can they be given consideration here. In either event a recommendation regarding the children will have to accompany the applications.

My dear Madam:

Upon receipt of your letter of January the 4th inquiry was made relative to the matter you mentioned in your letter and it was learned that your son was detailed at his own request to assist with the work at our school dairy. However, in compliance with your request, he has already been taken away from that work.

In this connection I must report that at this time your son can be given only general work because he is not old enough to do the heavier work that is required in the learning of a trade. At this time too I cannot assure you that he will have a chance to learn a trade because the shops are well filled with young men who are ready to go right ahead with their trades and still others waiting for a chance to get into the shops.

Regarding your daughter and your desire that she shall be given a chance to take piano lessons, this is to advise that all arrangements had been completed to have her

My dear Madam:

I have received your application to cover the enrolment at Carlisle of Cecelia Ermatinger, but because the girl is not yet fourteen years of age and there are no older brothers or sisters to send on to Carlisle with her she can not be admitted even if her transportation is paid for her by you or her parents. However, if the Commissioner of Indian Affairs will give you special authority for the enrolment I shall not object to her being sent here if the applications for the enrolment of Mary and Nora Gray are later found satisfactory and their enrolment is effected.

Regarding the proposed enrolment of the Gray girls, this is to state that the applications I return to you herewith must have noted thereon the approval of the Superintendent under whose jurisdiction the girls have formerly been. If they or their parents have not been under the jurisdiction of the Superintendent of an Agency or School their applications for enrolment will have to be submitted on the blank similar to
