5—Continued.

1. The provisions of this receipt shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the consignor, the consignee and all carriers handling this shipment, and shall apply to any re-shipment or return thereof.

2. In consideration of the rate charged for carrying said property which is regulated by the value thereof and is based upon a valuation of not exceeding Fifty dollars for any shipment of 100 pounds or less, and not exceeding Fifty cents per pound for any shipment in excess of 100 pounds, unless a greater value is declared at time of shipment, the shipper agrees that the Company shall not be liable in any event for more than Fifty dollars (\$50), on any shipment of 100 pounds or less, and for not exceeding Fifty cents per pound on a shipment weighing more than 100 pounds unless a greater value is stated herein, and said property is valued at, and the liability of the Company is hereby limited to, the values above stated, unless a greater value is declared at the time of shipment and stated herein, and charge for value paid or agreed to be paid therefor.

3. Said property is accepted as merchandise only, and the Company shall not be liable for the loss of money, bullion, bonds, coupons, jewelry, precious stones, valuable papers or other matter of extraordinary value, unless such articles are enumerated in the receipt, as the Company does not transport such articles except through its money department.

4. Unless caused by its own negligence, the Company shall not be liable for—

- Difference in weight or quantity caused by shrinkage, leakage, or evaporation.
- The death, injury or escape of live freight.

5. The Company shall not be liable for loss of damage, or delay, caused by—

- The act or default of the shipper or owner.
- The nature of the property, or defect or inherent vice therein.
- Improper or insufficient packing, securing or addressing.
- The Act of God, public enemies, authority of law, quarantine, riots, strikes, perils of navigation, the hazards or dangers incident to a state of war, or occurring in Customs warehouse.

6. Loss or damage in any way arising out of the examination by, or partial delivery to the consignee of C. O. D. shipments.

7. Any loss or damage occurring to shipments delivered by instructions of consignor or consignee at stations where there is no agent of the Company after such shipments have been left at such stations.

8. Packages containing fragile articles or articles consisting wholly or in part of glass must be packed so as to insure safe transportation by Express with ordinary care. If not so packed and plainly marked so as to indicate the nature of the contents the Company shall not be liable for damage to such shipment unless proved to be negligent.

9. If no Express Company has an agency at the point of destination, said property may be carried to the agency nearest or most convenient thereto and the consignee notified.

10. Claims for loss, damage, or delay must be made in writing to the carrier at the point of delivery or at the point of origin within four months after delivery of said property, or, in case of failure to make delivery, then within four months after a reasonable time for delivery has elapsed.

Suits must be instituted within one year after rejection of claims.

Unless claims are so made and suits so brought the carrier shall not be liable.

11. If any C. O. D. is not paid within thirty days after notice of non-delivery has been mailed to the shipper, the Company may, at its option, return the property to the consignor and collect the charges for transportation both ways.

12. The Company shall not be required to make free delivery at points where it maintains no free delivery service nor at any point beyond its established and published delivery limits.

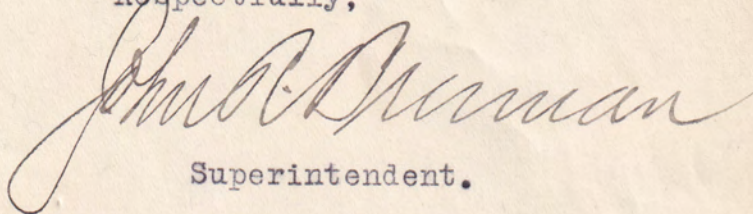

Louis has \$32.17 to his credit in our school bank. The cost of his transportation will be \$33.42 and as \$1.75 in cash will be given him there should be sent me without delay the sum of \$3.00 to cover the balance of the expenditures that will have to be made to get him away from this school.

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Joseph had to be confined to the County Jail at his outing home before he decided to do better, and it must have been while under the control of the County authorities that he was fed on bread and water. Such action is never taken except as a last resort, and when it is beliwed the only remaining expedient. It seems to have helped Joseph to do better, and no other complaints have been received concerning him.

from school, & says he will continue
running away until you get tired
of him & send him home.

should be forced to do so, I dont care
how much they are punished if they de-
serve it.

& have some of the civilized ways
to show to our Community when they
get back after their 3 years is up,
