Rt. Rev. George Biller, Jr., Bishop of South Dakota, Sioux Falls, S. D.

Sir:

I am informed that the friends of Emma Gunhammer are under the impression that she enrolled at Carlisle for a period of three years only, and that she is now held a prisoner at this school.

For your information I am sending a copy of her application blank, which shows that she was enrolled for a period of five years, and that the application blank was properly signed by one of her parents, by the agency physician, and by the Superintendent of the reservation.

In further reference, I desire to say that she is not held as a prisoner. This school does not hold Indians as prisoners. She has the freedom of the grounds and is accorded all the privileges which are given to other students of the school.

I am also sending you copy of the correspondence passing between the Superintendent of the Rosebud Agency and myself, in which the matter of this girl's return home before her termoof enrollment expired was left open

to his recommendation in accordance with the facts. I have just inquired of the matron with reference to the present status of this young lady, and have been informed that she is getting along nicely and is in good health.

Regarding her term of enrollment, I desire to say that these blanks were filled out in the office of the Superintendent of the reservation, and I hardly see how an error could be made, as it was necessary for three different parties on the reservation to sign the application blank before it was forwarded to me. I have examined the application carefully and note that there have been no changes made or any erasures. If the girl is needed at home and there is a good reason for terminating her stay at Carlisle before the expiration of her term of enrollment, and the matter has the approval of the Superintendent of the Rosebud reservation, the girl can be allowed to come home under the regulations governing matters of this kind.

So that you may have a better knowledge of the activities of the school, together with its organization, I am sending you under separate cover copies of my last two annual reports, the school catalogue and several other pamphlets.



My dear Sir:

I have your letter of July eighth which indicates that the Superintendent of the Rosebud Agency decided not to interfere in any way with Emma Gunhammer completing her term of enrollment. In doing this Superintendent Scriven acted entirely according to the regulations, as well as in a manner entirely just.

Gunhammer being held as a prisoner. She is no more a prisoner at this school than the 25,000 other Indian boys and girls and young men and young women who are enrolled in this and other schools of the Service. These atudents enter Indian Schools on their own volition and at the desire of their parents, and for the very best interests of the Indians it was decided a great many years ago that they should enroll for a certain period of time, so that they would obligate themselves to finish a definite portion of their education. In living up to their promises in they

60,000 American soldiers and more than that number of American sailors who enlist for a definite period of time in the service of their country.

Carried to its logical conclusion, your view of Indian students as prisoners would at once fell-swoop destroy the usefulness of the splendid system of education which the Government is now affording to the Indian people, and make the various schools dependent on the momentary whim and fancy of the students. Such a course would be ruinous to any school maintained for whites. Such agitation as this among the Indians is, undoubtedly, the cause of much discontent and seriously impedes the Government in its aim of educating and christianizing the Indian people.

The continual agitation in this case has served to make Emma, who is merely a girl and should continue with her education, discontented. I have seen this girl several times, and I know that it is the pressure from home that has kept her in a state of unrest. Consequently instead of doing this girl a service, this sort of thing is doing her a disservice.

The faculty has decided to give Emma leave of absence during the summer months, so that she can visit her home. Emma has made a premise in good faith to return to the school in September to complete her original and

woluntary term of enrollment. I hope that your efforts may be used, if this is necessary, in encouraging the girl to keep her word and fulfill her promise.

My dear sir:

Upon the receipt of your letter of June 24th in which you explained to me why Emma Gunhammer was not allowed to return to her home, I took up the matter, through our Missionary at Rosebud, with Mr. John H. Scriven. Superintendant of the Rosebud Agency. I am informed that Mr. Scriven approves of allowing Emma to return home but will not interfere because he has no authority over her now that she is twenty-two years of age. It appears therefore that her age puts her beyond the help of the Superintendant while it does not prevent her being held at a school, far away from her home, against her will.

I note that you say that Emma is not held a prisoner; but I respectfully submit that any woman twenty-two years of age who is confined within an institution against her will is to all intents and purposes a prisoner; and I believe that the best opinion would agree with me.

I have been hoping daily, that this woman has been allowed to return home but I have so far hoped in vain. I shall be very grateful to you if you will advise me further with regard to her case.

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.


