I, Lucy Beavers, being duly sworn, depose and say that I am a member of the Creek Nation in the Indian Territory, at present enrolled as a pupil at the Carlisle Indian school, Carlisle, Pennsylvania, and in attendance thereat; that I received as a member of said nation, as an allotment, the northeast quarter of section twenty-one (21) North, range seven (7) east, containing one hundred and sixty (160) acres; that subsequently I was authorized to sell the north half of said northeast quarter, containing ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~ eighty (80) acres, and did sell the same to Lake Moore and G. F. Clark for the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000); that in addition to said two thousand dollars (\$2,000), said Moore and Clark agreed to build a house upon the remaining eighty acres of land, which was done; that early in March, 1903, my mother and I went to Muskogee, Indian Territory, with said Moore and ~~xxx~~ Clark to receive the money payment for the land sold; that Mr. Thomas B. Needles, one of the Indian officials, was present and asked me whether I wanted money or a check, in reply to which I stated that I would take a check; that a check was accordingly given to me and I turned the same over to my mother to keep; that on the way home from Muskogee, while waiting to change cars at Crowder City, said Moore asked my mother for the check and she gave it to him, he saying that he would keep the money for Lucy and would give her proper papers for it when she came to his place of business at Weleetka; that he would pay interest on the money, thirty-two dollars (\$32) every three (3) months; that the following week I went to see him and asked for security for the money, but that he declined to give me any, saying he did not have time to attend to the matter then, but

would give it to me later; that subsequently I saw him a number of times, he frequently coming to my mother's home to stay while attending to business in Paden, Indian Territory, but that he always declined to give me any papers or security for my money when asked to do so, saying he would take good care of my money and would keep an accurate account of it. I have to state further that I received one hundred dollars (\$100) in cash from said Moore in Muskogee on the day when the check was received, March, 1903; that in May of the same year I received \$100 more to repair damage done to my house by a storm; that in May, 1904, I received seventy-five dollars (\$75) to use in going to the St. Louis Exposition; that at other times subsequently to May, 1904, and prior to coming to the Carlisle Indian school in October, 1904, I received odd sums amounting to one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150); and that since coming to Carlisle I received twenty-five dollars (\$25) at two different times. I have therefore received a total of four hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$475) from said Moore, leaving a balance of fifteen hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$1525) due in addition to interest.

I have to say further that I have made demands by letter upon said Moore at different times within the past year to have all my money sent to me here, but that I have received no response to such demands other than the remittance of twenty-five dollars (\$25) at two different times, as stated; that my mother has called upon him several times for the money, but that he has refused to pay the same, saying that it was all right with him and that he would pay it to me as I needed it.

I have to state further that I have records at my home in the Indian Territory of all payments made to me by said Moore prior to

coming to Carlisle, with dates and amounts, and that I am not therefore able to give the same with accuracy here.
