Since writing you on January the 9th and before your favor of January the 13th came to me I had enother talk with Margaret Pickett at my office. When I pointed out again to her the advantage of continuing with her training she finally consented to remain here longer than until June but it is yet her desire that you keep her in mind when a suitable vacancy occurs to which she could be appointed.

I would not recommend Margaret for a position at your Agency where she would have to go out to work among the Crow Indians by herself. However, if there should be an opportunity to get her a place in the Hospital, where she would be working with older and more experienced employees, her training should make her a useful worker.

I am yet in hopes that Margaret can be persuaded to continue with her course in nursing until she graduates. She could then go anywhere and make a start in her profession, and would not have to depend on a position where

I have your letter of January 9, concerning Margaret Pickett, whose period of enrollment will terminate at the end of the present school year.

This young woman wrote to me a month or so ago, telling of her desire to come back to the Reservation and work for the uplift of her people. I think that this would be a very unwise thing for her to do, and had a letter written to her a few days ago to that effect. It has been my experience that young women come back to the reservation with the highest possible ideals and intentions of uplifting the Tribe, but they are instead dragged back almost to the level of the old. uneducated blanket Indians.


I advised her to go into a white community, or among a tribe to which she is in no way related, believing that she would be able to accomplish more and with infinitely less risk to herself. I also recommended that she talk the matter over fully and frankly with you. which I trust she will do.

She was not on good terms with the headnurse, Misskuruger and the other nurse. She wrote a threatening letter to the other nurse. She also received boys from the school as visitors.

Margaret acknowledged to me that she did not get along with the other nurses. She said she did make the "threat" but it was only that she was going to report this nurse to

Head Nurse. She meant to do her no harm. She also acknowledged that she did receive boys but it was only as any lady would receive calls.
