I am in receipt of your letter of August 31, 1917, in which you request that Joseph Denny who is now a patient at the State Sanitarium at Mt. Alto, Pa.be returned to you.

In response you are advised that Joseph has just informed me that he is getting along fine at the sanitarium. I would not for one moment suggest that he leave this institution until the Hedical authorities at the head to willing for him to go. Joseph has a real case of tuber-culosis. Last winter we thought he had pneumonia, while working at Lebanon, Pa.at shy rate he returned to the school a very sick boy. By careful treatment he was built up and sent to a government sanitarium at Toledo, Idaho. Here he seemed to improve quite rapidly but objected to certain restrictions placed upon him, so he left and returned here.

When he arrived here, although he had improved at the sanitarium, it was apparentthat the trip had given him a set back, and arrangements were made for him to go to Mt. Alto, where he presumably is getting along fine. He should be left there until the doctors are willing for him to leave. I cannot too strongly impress upon you the fact that Joseph is now making a fight for his life, and for me or any of his relatives to urge him to leave the institution where he is receiving the best scientific treatment would be very much like signing Hoseph's death warrant.

I urge you, therefore to assist me in making Joseph satisfied in remaining at Mt. Alto, and receiving the treatment there.

Joseph Denny who came from Carlisle as a patient took French leave Monday without leaving his address intending, I understand, to return to Carlisle.

Joe when he first came was in bad shape, was a very good patient and made fine progress accordingly.

Of late however he has been disposed to be willful and use his judgment instead of mine as to what was best for him.

Last Saturday he went to town, a distance of a mile, contrary to my advice so I brought the matter to an issue and informed him that he had better go some place else if he intended to break the rules. I presume this is the reason why he left.

This boy, at the time he went to town, had a pulse of 120 evidence that his condition was not good and that bed was the proper place for him.

We have had quite a little difficulty in handling willful patients and have learned to our sorrow that such patients do not do well here and I have concluded that in

the future they must obey the rules implicitly or move on.

Denny seemed a nice boy and I regretted to see him go for the present is the only opportunity he will have to get well. If he shows up at Carlisle I would suggest that since he has money coming to him from a benefit society, that he use such money to defray his expenses in a sanatorium where, realizing that he is paying for treatment he might be disposed to put up the proper kind of a fight.

My dear Mr. Francis:

I have your letter of April 3rd, regarding the patient, Joseph Denny, and beg to say in reply thereto that I will reserve a bed for this young man, but do not think it advisable to subject him to the change from Carlisle to Toledo, just now; for I believe that the hard journey will do him more harm than the change of climate will good.

Cases of tuberculous pneumonia, with a history like Denny's usually prove fatal in spite of treatment. If this boy, however, was well before he developed pneumonia, I would suggest that before transporting him the conditions of empyema and pulmonary abscess be excluded. If his sputum is positive for tubercle bacilli this of course will settle the diagnosis.

Cases which are benefitted by treatment here are not as a rule so very urgent, so I am suggesting that Denny be held at Carlisle until the diagnosis is definitely established and the need of sanatorium treatment proved.

#### INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.



In this letter you state that you have so improved in health that you feel able to do work of some kind now, and want to know if we have something here for you to do. If there is nothing here, you want to know if something can be found elsewhere in the Service for you.

I am very serry that we have nothing here which we have to effer you. If you want to get into the Service elsewhere, it will be necessary for you to put in an application to the Indian Office, stating the kind of work you seek. As a physical examination is required, you must be sure of yourself along that line before you make application.

It seems to me, Joseph, that this is not a very good time of the year for one in your condition to start out to work. Why do you not wait until spring when the chances for escaping colds are so much better? Spring would be a good time for you to get on a farm where you could do light farm work. This would be my advice to you.




