## INDIAN ORDERED TO PAY FOR SUPPORT OF CHILD

Football Hero Who Hesitated Be-  
tween Two Possible Brides  
Must Aid Both.

Thomas St. Germain, Indian ath-  
letic and lawyer, winner of many  
football games and women, was re-  
leased by Judge Stelk in the Court  
of Domestic Relations yesterday on  
his promise to pay \$100 within a few  
days to Miss Jeanette Black of Phila-  
delphia, mother of his 2-year-old boy.

St. Germain was found guilty of  
the charge. After he pays the \$100  
he will be required to pay \$50 annu-  
ally for nine years. He says he al-  
ready has paid, for his child's sup-  
port, more than the total sum re-  
quired.

Instead of marrying Miss Black  
Jan. 8, as he had planned, St. Ger-  
main married Miss Janet Wilkins.

## INDIAN FINED FOR TREATMENT OF GIRL

Former Football Coach at  
Yale in Court

Thomas St Germain, Promised to  
One, Married Another

### Special Dispatch to the Globe

CHICAGO, Jan 17—Carrying her 2-year-old baby in her arms, Miss Jeanette Black, who says her father is a wealthy real estate dealer of Philadelphia, today told Judge Stelk in the Court of Domestic Relations the story of her meeting with Thomas St Germain, a graduate of the Carlisle Indian School and former assistant football coach at Yale.

The Indian repeatedly promised to marry her, she said, but on the day set, Jan 8 last, he went to Crown Point, Ind. and married Miss Janet Wilkins, an Iowa girl. Miss Black said she met the Indian at Villa Nova, Penn.

"After my baby came," she said, "my father was going to prosecute St Germain under the Mann act and I prevented it because he had promised to marry me."

St Germain told the judge that Miss Black's parents objected to their marriage because he was an Indian. St Germain has been married before. He obtained a divorce from his first wife in Wisconsin.

Judge Stelk found the Indian guilty of a serious charge. He must pay the mother \$550.
