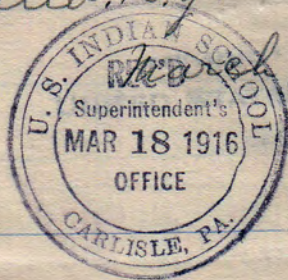



There is forwarded herewith letter received from Mrs. Carrie Jones, making inquiry relative to the money to the credit of her son, Eugene Jones.


From information contained in this file it appears that at the time Eugene Jones deserted from Carlisle in May 1909, he had to his credit the sum of \$46.24 as individual Indian money. It appears that in March 1911 Superintendent Friedman drew a check for the full amount and forwarded it to the boy by mail, apparently forwarding it to his supposed address as the whereabouts of the boy had not been discovered. This check was never returned to Carlisle nor has it been cashed. The mother now desires to collect the amount of money still remaining to the credit of the boy.

Information is requested as to whether the whereabouts of Eugene Jones is now known and whether information is at hand showing whether he is living or dead.

Information is also desired as to the manner in which this fund is now held and whether action was ever taken on this account in accordance with paragraph 115 of the regulations governing individual Indian money.

After examining this file it is requested that all the letters forwarded by Mrs. Jones as inclosures to her letter of August 1st be returned to her at Basom, New York.

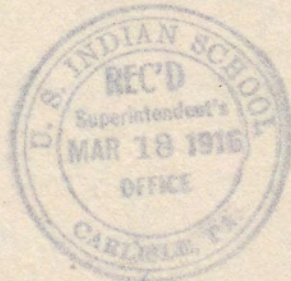

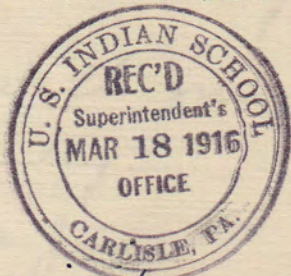

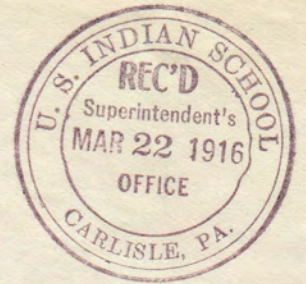
