INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Dear Mr. Lipps:

I have your letter of the first instant relative to the transportation of Louis Twin from Carlisle to Winnebago at an expense of \$29.77 from "Proceeds of Labor, Winnebago Indians". I have to advise that this young man is now on the reservation.

We regret exceedingly that this fund has been used for returning this young man. We are finding it difficult to make ends meet in financial matters and dislike to have money spent on a young man of this kind. He received his head right money only to go on a glorious spree and land there broke only to be sent home at the expense of the agency. Personally, I would let him stay there until he got hoary with age before I would consent to spend a penny in returning him.

Dear Mr. Lipps:

I have been requested to answer your letter regarding Louis Twin, inasmuch as the Superintendent was called away today, and he was desirous of giving you an immediate answer.

Louis Twin has no money here, nor have his brothers, while his father has a little money, but is entirely dependent on his monthly allowance from this source for his support, and cannot spare any. Louis has not been on this reservation for months, probably years, since on Nov. 12th 1914, we sent him at some place in Michigan, his headright check amounting to \$317.91, this being the first time this office had even heard of his whereabouts since the headright payment in September 1913.

Since he has so carelessly squandered his resources, I do not think any course will bring him to his senses as quickly as to let fight his own battle.

Dear Mr. Young:

I have your letter of February fourth regarding the return of Louis Twin to your reservation, and the payment of his expenses from "Proceeds of Labor, Winnebago Indians." In reply, I have to advise that I requested the Office to authorize me to pay Louis' expenses out of "Indian School Support Fund," but Louis being more than twenty-one years of age, the Office was probably unable to grant this request on account of the law prohibiting the payment of traveling expenses of students more than twenty-one years of age. I could not keep Louis at the school and I could not turn him out in the cold, although that is what he deserved. I simply put the matter up to the Office and asked them what I should do with him, and they gave me the instructions.

There should be a place for such fellows as Louis, and we will never do much with this class of Indians, which I am sorry to say seems to be increasing, until we have institutions especially equipped in which to place them. Louis appears to be a professional base ball player, and was expelled from this school several years ago for misconduct. In fact, I am

informed that all of the Twin boys who have been at Carlisle
have been bad ones and none of them have done any good.

My dear Mr. Young;

Louis Twin, one of your wards, arrived in the town of Carlisle several days ago flush with money and with a beautiful jag on. As long as his money lasted he had plenty of friends, but his money was soon gone and a few days ago he came to the school, dead broke, having pawned his suitcase the day before for fifty cents to get his supper. I took him in and gave him a place to sleep and his meals. The next day he was arrested on a charge of assaulting and robbing an old woman in the town of Carlisle. At the preliminary hearing last Saturday he was cleared of this charge. Having no money and no place to go, he returned to the school. I gave him a place to sleep and told him on condition that he would remain at the school and be under the rules of the school, he might stay, provided he was willing to work for his board, until he could get funds from home to pay his expenses in returning to the reservation. I find that the young man was at one time enrolled at Carlisle as a student but was expelled sometime ago and since that time he appears to have been an itinerant baseball player.

Please get in communication with his people and tell them of his condition and advise me as soon as possible what

they can do in the way of furnishing him funds to get back home. I cannot keep him here indefinitely and would not have allowed him to stay at the school at all only that it is very cold winter weather here and I did not have the heart to turn him out of doors at this season of the year.

INDIANS EVEN UP WITH LOCAL CLUB

Visitors Take Second Game of Series From Schmitz & Shroder Club.

SEVEN RUNS SCORED IN ONE INNING DECIDE GAME

Duncanson and Chapman Hit Hard in Seventh But Heider Puts on Brakes.

Nebraska Indians evened up the count on their Detroit series by downing the Schmitz and Shroder club in 9 to 5 style before a crowd of 2,200 fans, eager to see the famous aboriginal team.

As in the Saturday contest one inning decided the battle. Up to the seventh round it looked all S. & S., when with the score standing 5 to 2 against them the Indians nailed seven runs that made the game very safe.

In this seventh round Duncanson was found for four hits and these with a couple of errors allowed them to tie up the score. With one down Duncanson was yanked and Chapman sent in. The newcomer walked the first man, filling the bases, and a pair of clean hits followed, bringing the Indian total up to nine. Then it was up to Heider to stop the clouting. He twirled swell ball and by the use of the spitball put on the brakes, refusing his opponents a hit during the remainder of the game.

Outside of this seventh round the game was hard fought all the way. The visitors showed their real spirit by their uphill fight that finally resulted in victory.

The hitting of Newashe was responsible for many of the visitors' runs, as this player, who was with Philadelphia last spring, hits good enough for any league.

Another player that deserves much credit is young Twin, the 18-year-old third sacker, who covers all kinds of ground and hits anything that the hurlers offer. He is being watched by a couple of league scouts and Guy Green expects to lose him at any time.

George Harms and Scotty Cameron played fine ball for the home team.

McConachie was injured in the third inning and DeVoght was called in to do the catching, Mac going to left field.

Taken all in all, it was a hard game for the S. & S. boys to lose and the hustling Indians made many friends by their gameness and never say die spirit.

Playing Manager Tobey made a decided hit with the large crowd by his coaching and pulled off a lot of original stuff on the job.

The Indians will stop at Detroit again in about seven weeks and the fans will have another chance to see the fleet footed Redskins. Crescents play at Mack park next Sunday. Score:

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Testimony of Louis Twin.

My name is Louis Twin. I am twenty-five years old. I am a full blood Indian, and belong to the Winnebago tribe. My home is Winnebago City on the Winnebago reservation. I receive an annuity or a certain sum of trust money from the United States Government every once in a while. I receive it from the hands of my Agent, Mr. S. A. M. Young, Indian Agent of the Winnebago Reservation. In the latter part of November of last year I received from the United States, through the hand of Indian Agent Young, the sum of \$317.91 treaty money, or trust money, which the Government distributes among my people.

I was on my way to Washington to see about some lands of my people which I wanted to know about, because I inherited some of the land. I stopped at Carlisle, I think it was about November 28, to see my little brother who I expected was a pupil at the Indian school, although I had not seen him for some years. After I went out to the school I found that my brother was gone from the school. I returned to town and went to Harrisburg where I got some whiskey and came back to Carlisle I think about Sunday night.

I met Genus Baird, an Indian, a friend of mine. Then I rented a room. The next morning Genus Baird came to my room and woke me up. I had been drinking and I had a headache. He told me he would fix me up and I gave him half a dollar and he went out and got two half pints of whiskey. He brought them to my room and he and I drank the two half pints and then we went down to have something to eat at the C. V. Restaurant. When

we reached the restaurant, I gave Genus a dollar to go and get some more whiskey and he went and got it while I was eating. He came back with a pint and a half pint, and while we were in the restaurant we drank either the half pint or the pint, I don't remember which. After I had eaten, he took me over to his boarding house and introduced me to his landlady. He and I drank the other bottle of whiskey over there. I think we drank it in the closet so that the landlady would not see us. By that time I was feeling pretty good so he and I started out and we went to the Wellington hotel. I think it was sometime in the early afternoon that we started for the Wellington hotel, although I was not paying any attention to time and am not sure just what the hour was.

When I was walking around with Genus I asked him if he knew where I could get something to drink and he said, "Yes, we can get it at the Wellington." So we went over to the Wellington and we went into the barroom, and there were several men up against the bar, two of whom I knew; they were Constable Honey Sheaffer and Hump Snyder. Genus called the bartender up to the bar and said to him, "I have a friend here; you know about him; he is Buck Twin, and he is on his way to Washington to see about some land; he is all right," and Holmes, the bartender, said "All right, what will you have?" I think I took a bottle of beer, although I know I took whiskey or beer. Genus Baird told Holmes that I was a ball player, and then I knew this

Constable, named Honey Sheaffer, because he used to umpire games at the Indian school, and so I treated him and the other Constable, Hump Snyder, and on that round I had, I think, a small glass of beer. Then I went over to the jail with Genus to visit S. J. Nori, an Indian, who was in jail. When I came back from the jail I went to the Wellington and got some more. During the next two weeks I was intoxicated all the time, and I got all my liquor, beer and whiskey at the Wellington. I kept on this drunk until all my money was gone. I could not get liquor any where else in town. During these two weeks I stayed at Mrs. Meek's in Carlisle, and at the Carlton Hotel in Harrisburg, and when I was at Harrisburg I would take a machine to Carlisle in order to get to the Wellington to get whiskey. During the two weeks I was on a drunk, from November 30th on, I got liquor from bar-tender Holmes about fifteen times, although that may not be the exact number but about that many times. I kept it up until all of my money was gone. One day I went into the bar and bar-tender Holmes leaned over to me and he said, "Buck, there was a big fellow in here a little while ago and he told me not to sell you anymore whiskey, and I am not selling Genus Baird anymore either." I said, "Well, that is all right then, just give me a glass of water." He gave me a glass of sater.

One night the police of Carlisle picked me up and took me to the police station and telephoned up to the school that they had me. They must have thought that I was a student at the school. When they heard from the school that I was not a

student, they turned me loose and I then had 80¢ in my pocket. It was the last of my \$300. I went back to the Wellington hotel and I got whiskey from Holmes with the 80¢ until I was drunk. That ended my money and it also ended my drunk. I think it was the next day that I sold my overcoat and got \$7.00. It was not until after I had spent my 80¢ and got a quarter from an Indian, who runs a store, and went back to the Wellington with 10¢ or 15¢ left that Holmes told me that he would not sell me anymore. After I spent the 80¢ in the Wellington I slept all night with two Indian boys, who live in Carlisle, named Bradby and Favel, and the next morning I pawned my overcoat. I got \$7.00 for it and Genus Baird went out and got some whiskey. I don't know where he got it. They never sold me anymore at the Wellington, because I never went back after they refused to sell me anymore when I was down to my last 15¢.

Testimony of Joseph Hancock.

My name is Joseph Hancock. I live in Carlisle. I was in the bar of the Wellington hotel, I think it was on Monday morning rather close to noon, Constable Sheaffer and Constable Hump Snyder were there also. Louis Twin and another Indian, named Genus Baird, came into the bar. They recognized Sheaffer as a fellow who played and umpired base ball and Hump Snyder also, and we all got to talking about base ball. Twin was introduced to me and I remember seeing his brother, Buck Twin, play base ball in Carlisle. Twin invited us to have a drink. I had a glass of beer. After that, Twin treated a couple of times; each time he took whiskey and beer and I only took beer. I stayed there until dinner time. Twin insisted on me having dinner with him and I went over and had dinner at the C. V. restaurant. After dinner at the C. V. restaurant, Twin invited me to go back to the Wellington with him. Genus Baird was along. We went back to the Wellington and Twin treated a couple of times again. Each time I took beer and he took whiskey sometimes and sometimes he took beer. We stayed there all afternoon. Twin was flush with money; he seemed to have a lot of it and was spending it freely. We were in the bar until about nine o'clock that evening. Twin bought a number of times for the crowd, more than five or six times. He not only got whiskey and beer from Holmes, but he also got whiskey and beer from the other bar-tender, McBride, and drank it there. McBride's full name is Frank McBride. When we broke

up at nine o'clock, Twin was quite drunk, although he was not staggering. At this present minute, I do not remember whether bar-tender Holmes was on first and bar-tender McBride relieved him, or it was the other way around, but both bar-tenders waited on us that day and both bar-tenders sold Twin beer and whiskey when he treated the crowd. I know it was more than five or six times but I could not give the exact number of times.

The only other time that I ever drank with Louis Twin was on the afternoon, I think, of December 17th. At all events, it was the same afternoon that Louis Twin had the law suit against the sporting girl in Alderman Hughes' office. It was between four and five o'clock in the afternoon. I walked to the Wellington with Twin after the hearing. Holmes was the bar-tender on duty. Louis Twin treated; Twin took whiskey and bought a half pint of whiskey. He asked for whiskey and he got it; he put the half pint in his pocket. Then Holmes treated and I took beer and Twin drank beer. Twin asked for beer and got beer and drank it. Twin was not sober at the Alderman's office nor when he walked with me down the street, nor was he sober in the hotel.

Testimony of Edward Corbett.

My name is Edward Corbett. I live in Carlisle. I am night watchman at the Indian School and assistant deputy police. I saw Louis Twin first at Squire Martin's Office. They had a hearing there, and after the hearing Twin and Mr. Hancock went out and I walked down Main Street and stopped at the Wellington hotel to see whether they had gone in there. Just as I stepped in I heard Louis Twin ask for a drink of whiskey, and the bar-tender put the bottle out, but whether the bar tender had given it to him I do not know, but I had warned Mr. George Holmes. I said, "If I were you I would not sell any whiskey to the Indians." He said, "This boy does not belong to the school, he is a citizen." I said, "George, I don't believe I would see to any Indians whether they are citizens or not. You would be better off," and left it at that. He admitted having sold Louis the whiskey and claimed that he did so because the boy was a citizen and a voter. I think this was on the 17th of December. It was between four and five o'clock, about twenty minutes after the hearing. They had just left the hearing and started down street. I never knew Louis Twin before that time. He was then pretty well filled.

My dear Mr. Young:

Referring further to our correspondence relative to the very undesirable presence here in Carlisle of Louis Twin, I respectfully submit below for your information a copy of a letter that was addressed to me by the Office on January the 26th. In accordance with the authority granted therein Louis was provided with transportation to Winnebago and was started away from Carlisle on Saturday evening, the 30th ultimo.

"Your letter of January 18, 1915, relative to Louis Twin, is at hand.

There is enclosed authority for payment of not to exceed \$35 from "Indian Moneys, Proceeds of Labor, Winnebago Indians" for the transportation of this Indian from Carlisle to his home within or near the Winnebago reservation, Nebraska. This is intended to cover his transportation and any necessary incidental expenses, but it will be necessary for you to consider whether he can safely be intrusted with any money. Possibly he can take sufficient food with him for his subsistence until he reaches his home."

There had been received here for Louis a letter which contained an amount of something over three dollars.

The letter was not delivered to him until he left on Saturday evening, so that only the amount required to pay for his transportation, \$29.77, will have to be charged to the authority that was given to expend \$35.00 to get him away from Carlisle.

In order that our files may be complete I would thank you to advise me whether he has arrived at his father's home.
