Supervisor Lipps:

In regard to Johnson Powhrodep's case I will say that he is at present in very fair condition. In spite of this his eyes are in very bad condition as a result of trachoma. Repeated acute attacks occurring from time to time and practically incapacitating the boy. It is my opinion that the very aggravated cases of trachoma, those in which the eyes and the eyesight have suffered marked deterioration, should not be retained at school for the reason that confinement and eye-strain combine to produce still further injury. I would keep such cases only when proper medical attention can not be obtained at the child's home. In my opinion Johnson Powhrodep & Silas White can with advantage be dismissed, conditions being favorable as stated.

I want to call attention to the fact that Louis Headley is again in the hospital with acutely inflamed eyes, whereas Silas White claims that he cannot wear the glasses fitted by Dr. Fox. I was previously unsuccessful in bringing his sight to anything like the normal. This only indicates the limitations of treatment in eyes that have been hopelessly injured by years of trachomatous disease.

I will be glad to have Johnson Powhrodep go to Dr. Fox for consultation. I think, however, that it is essential that I receive a report on all cases sent out for consultation so that I know what treatment has been instituted and what further attention is required.

My dear Mr. Stinchecum:

We are sending you this date a night letter in reply to your telegram, asking whether or not Johnson Pahrowdeup would be acceptable for reenrollment here. In our night letter we are informing you that because of low academic attainments of this boy and because of the probability of his reinfection with trachoma, it does not seem advisable for him to return here.

The undersigned conferred with Johnson's class-room teacher, his disciplinarian, and the school physician, before sending the night letter above referred to. The boy's record in the class-room and quarters seems to be satisfactory, although he is very decidedly boorish and somewhat inclined toward slovenliness. Our school physician objects very strongly to Johnson's readmission and he states that he would not care to be responsible for the results either to Johnson or to the other pupils in case the boy is readmitted. In addition to the physician's objection, I may emphasize the matter of Johnson's low academic attainments. Johnson could not enter anything above beginning grade four at best, and I have the feeling that he could get satisfactory instruction in the primary grades nearer his home and at much less expense than would devolve upon him by coming to Carlisle. We very much prefer to fill his place with someone of higher attainments, especially when the work of the lower grades can be secured by almost any pupil near his home.
