Upper and middle grade men may receive mail on the first day of the month... Inmates are allowed to wear only the underwear, shoes, socks, and... Items are not to be sent outside... Ad mail for inmates should be addressed in name of inmate to care, Box W. E., Green Bay, Wis., and be directed to the Superintendent or the institution... NOTE - A flag station called "Wireless" has been established at the Reformatory by the Chl. M. & S. P. R. R. for the transportation of passengers.

Dear Sir.

I received two arrows from the school and appreciated them very much and also a couple of letters from you and a postal card stating that you want me to reenroll. I would gladly do so if you would receive me after the trouble I've gotten into and I'd assure you that I would toe the mark while there I will be out the first of this coming August. So if you can arrange it so that I can enroll kindly let me know in your first letter you write me I have a good start now of making a man out of myself and I don't want to fall down again and I think I can't do nothing better than go to the Carlisle Indian School again and stay there as long as I can and not run away like I did why I wasn't away from there a year before I landed here. But I'm mighty glad I did land here as I think this place has made a man out of me I know a good many more who attended Carlisle will land in a place like this if they don't change their courses and when they do they'll change their courses pretty sudden just as I have done so kindly give each and every one a warning not to hit up the booze because that was my first step toward this place. I am here now for 16 mths and it seems

11 days. You can write to Mr Joseph C. Hart and see what he thinks about my enrolling at Carlisle. I wish you would send me a catalogue of the Carlisle Indian School and a few pictures of the buildings there as I would like to see how the pupils are getting along. I am well and hope this few lines will find you and every one at Carlisle the same. And I ask you to ask every one of the pupils of Carlisle to forgive me and also ask it of you for making the people think you turn any one like me out of the school of Carlisle. And I ask each and every one of you to pray for me that I may become a man of some kind and show what benefit I got out of attending the school. And I am going the straight and narrow path from now on. Also give each and every one my warmest regards. And kindly ask Welch that Quarter Back if he remembers the time I rode the mule down at the Dairy Barn. And please don't forget the catalogue of the school. And kindly let me know if I ~~can~~ can enroll after I leave this place I will close now trusting the above will help me to get in Carlisle once more and began all over.
