Since you will not receive this until Mon - I will not send Ernest until Tues - leaving Buffalo. I think about 7 P. M. arriving at Carlisle the next morning. Hoping that you will bring out all his best points which I don't seem to grasp, since being compelled to earn our daily bread I have had to leave him much to his own resources, and his being at the adolescent age makes things

worry me. Not that he is hard to manage or mischievous, but that he hasn't had enough to do or the things to do to hold his interest.

He is fond of carpentering work and I wish him to have a chance at it, and of course if he shows an aptitude for it, to have a thorough training in it. He is also fond of reading good books especially, Alger's. He is more contented with the society of small boys, than with boys of his own age or older, and has no bad habits, like cigarettes or gambling or being out late yet, so far as I know, as he is always at home with me every night. Hope to hear of him thru his teachers or yourself from time to time

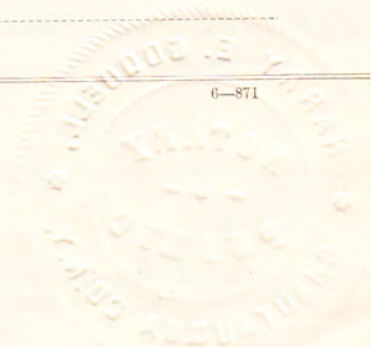

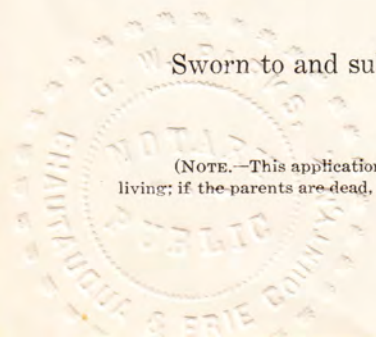
