INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.



Dear Sir; Some six years ago I left your school, And although I have never kept in very close touch with my Alma Mater I have always had a warm spot for it, And have often thought and talked of the years spent there.

I have been planing on going back on a visit but seems I cant find a slack season to get away in. Right now I am expecting to come back in the Fall. I would like very much to get back while some of my old acquaintances are still there.

I have a Girl Cousin out here who would like very much to come back there and take a course in some branch, I am not sure just what she would care to take. She has no means to see her through such a school out here, And I have talked to Her of Carlisle and she would like to come back and get what education she can. She has finished High School I think.

She is writing to the Supertendant asking permission to be taken in, Now as I always went to you with my troubles while I was there. You where The first one I thought of when she asked me to write and see if I could help her in any way. So I am again asking you for a favor and do certainly hope that some day I can repay you for all thr favors granted me while at Carlisle.

Dear friend Leonard:

Your good letter of a recent date was forwarded to me here from Carlisle and I assure you that I am glad to know you have continued in the same business you had just opened when last I heard from you. I hope I shall hear from time to time that you are prospering and becoming more and more a leader in your community.

Mrs. Meyer and I have been away from Carlisle since the beginning of last October. I was principal of the school at Keshena, Wisconsin, from that time until the latter part of February and since then I have been in charge here as Superintendent. This country is yet ice bound, but the edges of the ice fields on the lakes are now loosening and in just a very little while longer we should be able to get our boats launched. Our summer travel is practically all by boat.

Relative to the enrolment at Carlisle of your girl cousin I take this opportunity to inform you that I am sending your letter to Superintendent Francis at Carlisle. As Mr. and Mrs. Denny and your other friends yet at Carlisle know you so favorably I am sure that every consideration will be given your cousin's and your own request. If I can say a good word for you do not hesitate to let people know that I shall gladly say that word.

Dear Sir:

It has been some little time since I have written to Carlisle, and as I know you try to keep in touch with all old students, and I am always proud to claim such for myself, I thought I would write you a short letter telling of my success.

First, I have been married since March 1912, here, of course the dearest wife in the world and a boy, just past eight months that is also hard to beat, I am working for the United States Reclamation Service as machinist, making very good wages considering the short time I have been out of school, and the short time I have been here, I came up here the 10th of last April and have not lost an hour since, work eight hours a day, Sun days and all, my check each month runs very close to one hundred dollars.

I have been to Grand Junction several times it is only a few miles from here, I have seen the buildings of the former Indian school at that place, I am sorry it is not running as I would like to visit.

They are digging three of the largest tunnels the

Reclamation service has dug, one $16^{\text{ft}} \times 22^{\text{ft}} \times 3800^{\text{ft}}$. The second $16^{\text{ft}} \times 22^{\text{ft}} \times 2700^{\text{ft}}$ The third $16^{\text{ft}} \times 20^{\text{ft}} \times 7900^{\text{ft}}$. They are nearly through the first one, just starting on the second, the longest one will be started some time this fall. My work is to keep the drilling machines repaired, the air line in service and general machine repairing. I expect to stay here for a few years and try and get a better job on another project.

I hope to visit Carlisle in the near future, my wife, who hails from Shamokin Pa. and son was back there on a visit during April and May. I hope to get back some time next year.

I got a letter from Miss Lecorne, telling me of a boy in the school in Oregon, where she is teaching, that wants to go to Carlisle and also to Conway, I hope he can be granted the same favors that were granted me, I am very much interested in both schools and am glad when I can in any way help either initiators.

I will close with best wishes for yourself, and Carlisle.
