Application for Enrollment in a Nonreservation School.

(For a child not enrolled at an Agency.)

For and in consideration of the United States assuming the care, education, and maintenance in the United States Indian School at Carlisle Pennsylvania, of Henry M. Jordan, male, I, Louise Jordan of Kenwood P. O., State of N. Y., do hereby voluntarily consent and agree to his enrollment in said school for a period of five years, and also obligate and bind myself to abide by all the rules and regulations for Indian schools.

I further say that the said child was born at Port Jervis N. Y. on July 17, 1893; that the father, Jonathan Jordan, was a q. b. Indian of the Oneida Tribe located at Oneida N. Y. Agency; that he left the tribe about 1855; that the mother, Louise Jordan, is a q. b. Indian of the St. Regis Tribe located at St. Regis Franklin Co. N. Y. Agency, and left the tribe about 1889; that the said child was born and reared in the United States, and now actually resides therein; and that he has attended the following schools:

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

some time ago as I noticed on post
mark, I have just received, I was
very glad to hear from you sir,
and it makes me happy to think
that you are interested in my progress
& I am now working in the
Continental Can Company located
in Syracuse N. Y., I am learning
to be a machinist, I am very well

satisfied my place, I started
 in as an apprentice, with the tool-
 room, as a rule, a boy who takes
 up this trade spends at least
 one year in the tool room before
 he is allowed to go on the floor
