Dear Friend:

I have your letter dated November 5th in which you say that you wish to come to Haskell as a student for this winter; that you have been at Carlisle and wish to return but cannot do so because you have no money.

In reply you are advised that our school is full and we have no room for any more students at this time. In fact, our school has been full almost since the opening day and it has been necessary to deny admission to a large number of deserving young people who wished to come here this year. Even though we had room, we could not consider your enrollment here unless you have completed your term at Carlisle and have been honorably released from that school. I infer from your letter that you have not completed your term of enrollment there. Then, too, under the rules of the Indian Office, we cannot take students for a period less than three years (unless they should graduate from some special course within that time) and we could not therefore consider your enrollment, under any circumstances, for

just the winter months.

You cannot expect to accomplish much in your school work unless you begin with your classes on the opening day in the fall, and continue through until the close of school in June. If you are still of school age, and are earnest in your desire to further your training, I would urge that you make every effort to return to Carlisle at the earliest date possible.

You went to work with the understanding that it would give you a chance to settle for the indebtedness that was incurred in bringing you to Carlisle and it is only fair that you should remain where you are at least until you have earned enough to pay for what you owe.

I will also state that it has been the policy here not to encourage boys to take up baseball playing as a profession because the majority of Indian boys are not fitted to withstand all the temptations of such a career. Your eyesight has caused you trouble in the past and it is my opinion that that alone would bar you from ever making a success as a ball player.

Replying thereto I regret to advise that thru the connivance of a restaurant man here in Carlisle Henry has succeeded in having the checks cashed without the knowledge of the authorities here and has expended the money, so that the amount required to pay for his transportation to Carlisle is yet due.

Henry now claims that he will pay at the end of this month, but unless funds for his use are sent direct to this office there is no way in which the matter can be properly supervised. I beg leave to request, therefore, that all funds for his use be sent direct to me.

I have not attended to yours of Feb 11th as I shd. Business & absence have prevented.

It looks as if H. H. Hennessey or Henry Paji as he is generally called here has been using a little deceptiveness; His sister Mrs. Minnie Keeler gave me to send him the following. Jan 26, 1912 \$32.00 + Jan 27. 7.50 + Feb 7. 20., as my check book shows. I have not the cancelled checks returned, but presume he got them, though tardy mail or other mishaps may have prevented their receipt.

I may say that I don't know much about Henry Paji, though I presume he counts himself an adherent of our church. His father Samuel Paji was a member but died over 10 yrs ago, and though Samuel & his sister were baptized in infancy, neither has made a profession in our church. But Henry Paji has never ~~not~~ attended here much, on account of absence and living at a distance when here. However I have never heard anything to his discredit.

Hennessee's enrollment at your school, will state that Henry was informed, that in the event his application was found all-right, you would so notify him, and place transportation. I have every reason to believe that he was aware of the fact that he would be expected to pay his own R.R. fare, since he was over 21 years of age.

Henry has no money to his credit at this Agency, and there are no immediate prospects of his getting any through land leasing or sales.

As to adjusting this matter, and reimbursing yourself for the amount of the transportation advanced, I know of no other way than the suggestion contained in my letter of Dec. 8.

I write you a line at the request of Henry P. Hennessey, one of your pupils from Yankton Agency, where I live. His father and mother were both members of our Mission Church here, but both died when Henry was a small boy; and he had a poor chance, in moral and religious lines especially. I am glad he went to Carlisle as I know the religious influence is good, and he speaks as if he was being improved thereby.

But the reason I write you is principally because he wants to come home to spend the summer vacation, and he wishes my testimony, to the fact that all his near relatives are dead except his older sister, Mrs Minnie P. Keeler, with whom he has made his home since his parents died. And she has been in poor health for some time and is not expected to live long. And he is fearful he will not see her again if he does not come. If he is granted leave he says he will have the money for travelling expenses both ways in your hands before he starts. The facts I believe to be correct, and you can judge better than I what is best to do.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

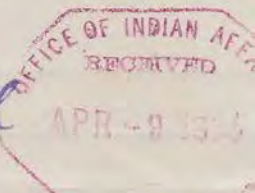

Blank forms are being enclosed herewith on which to bring your application to the Superintendent's attention.
