Your letter to Mr. Francis comes to me as Mr. Francis has left the Indian Service and joined the Army. He took the examination for a commission several weeks ago and secured a first lieutenancy. He is now stationed at Fort Niagara, Youngstown, N.Y. We all miss him very much and yet admire him for what he has done.

I am glad to know you have enjoyed getting the Arrow. We try to get the addresses of all our soldier boys and keep in touch with them by sending them the paper every week. In this way we have gotten some very nice letters from our boys. I am sorry we will have only one more paper to send you, then we will not print any more until September, when school opens. This last issue is what we call the Year Book 1918 and will contain many nice pictures of the school.

We have a very small school now as most of our boys and girls are under the cutting now, the boys doing war work on the farms and in the ship yards and the girls doing housework. Those of us who are here, work too. We have our two farms going full swing and it keeps the boys busy getting in the crops, and the girls putting up the vegetables.

Let us hear from you from time to time. We are always glad to hear from our soldier boys. With my best regards to you, I am

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.
