My dear Friend:-

I have looked carefully into your case and find that, owing to your action in disseminating literature of an unseemly character among the students when in attendance at the Carlisle Indian School, the Superintendent, acting within his authority, found it necessary to examine your mail. Your letter to the Superintendent of the White Earth Agency, criticizing the Superintendent of the Carlisle School was not only disloyal and disrespectful to your superior officer, but was also an evidence of your lack of appreciation of the scholastic benefits which you were enjoying through the munificence of the Government.

Loyalty to your Superintendent should have been your first consideration, and the least reparation you could have made would have been to apologize to Mr. Friedman, when he made it clear to you how you had transgressed.

My entire time is devoted to securing employment for young men and women of Indian blood, and it affords me personal satisfaction to recommend worthy, competent boys

and girls for appointment to lucrative positions. There is, however, a reciprocal obligation on the part of those I recommend. Efficiency is important, but manliness and integrity of purpose are the first consideration.

By this time I am sure you realize that you have not acted the part of a man and I do not believe you would want your office record clouded by this report of ungentlemanly conduct. When you have acted honorably, that is when you have apologized to Mr. Friedman for your misconduct and assured him that you not only regret your action in not making an apology to him when he gave you the opportunity to do so, but also that you regret writing the letter to Superintendent Howard, I shall then feel that when I recommend you for appointment, I am recommending a man who will not only "make good" but whose record in whatever position he may be placed will be one I can point to with pride.

Let me hear from you right away for I am sure you desire to start out in life with the highest purpose and are determined to make good not only as an Indian but as a man and a citizen. I shall expect to hear from you very soon.

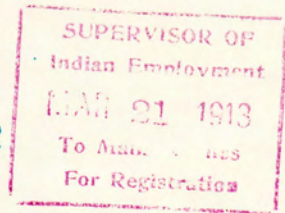

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school shall be furnished with the original of this form for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the office of the superintendent in charge of the reservation. The Reservation Superintendent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer. 6-870

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.
