#### INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats.,

p. 348.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Dominic Bresette who ran from this school during the early part of the summer and who claims to have lost a suit of clothes here reported this loss to my office at the time and I made careful inquiry into the matter but was unable to locate any such suit among the boys nor was I able to find any clothier in Carlisle who had sold him a suit. He bot a suit from Edward Bressette and a swetter for ten dollars both articles having been worn by Edward for some time. This suit I am sure he wore when he left the school. The swetter he sold to John Gokee whom he accuses of having stolen it, for \$1.50 and Gokee says this money he paid Bressette in the presence of William Butterfly.

Dominic upon his departure from the school took a watch belonging to Norman Thompson with him. Where so many young men are together it is natural that some clothing will be missed but the boys who have been in this school for some years tell me that this condition is much improved from the past years and that now the loss of elothing is very small. I am of the opinion that this was simply taken as a pretext by Dominic to square him in his desertion and I would suggest that he be returned to this school to fulfil his term of enrollment here.

Dominick Bresette one of the young men who ran away from Carlisle, and whom I telegraphed about the other day, is now in the office. He states that he likes Carlisle and it seems from his conversation that he would probably not have run away if his clothing, that is his personal clothing, had not been The young man accuses two boys in particular; Simon Soulier and John Gokee, who, he believes made way with his new clothing. He states that when he would get any money from this office for the purchase of new clothing that soon after the purchase was made his clothing would be missing. This seems to have angered him so that he decided to run away, or at least this is the idea I get from my conversation with him. He says that John Gokee took his sweater and that one of the home party boys stole his suit; by this he means the boys whose time is up and who have returned to their homes. Dominick does not seem to be inclined to return to Carlisle, although, of course, if you wish him to return we can return him under police regulations. I do not like to force his return if you do not care to have him return,

I sent you on September 1st, advising you that I Butterfly and Dominick Bresette here and would pro-

ent standing with this office and I believe that the boy is in armest and seems to do the right thing. As stated above he is not displeased with his treatment at Carlisle, excepting a complaint that the disciplinarian made no effort to have the clothing, which was stolen from him, returned. As to the correctness of this statement, of course, I know nothing more than what he has told me, but I would be pleased to have you look into the matter, and at the time you advise me whether you want me to return him state if the boy's clothing was stolen, and if so, if you have been able to have it returned. Perhaps you might get some information by speaking to Edward Bresette, whom Dominick says was one of his friends at Carlisle.

We have not yet been able to locate Mike Abidosh.

He may have returned to Carlisle. In your letter of July 10th you stated that he also was a runaway.
