SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.


Referring to your letter of March 5th, to Mr. Dominick Bresette, Red Cliff, Wisconsin.

I wish to advise you that Mr. Dominick Bresette, when he returned to the Reservation as a run-away, was given the option to return to Carlisle at once or not being permitted to use his funds, as he argued that he was able to take care of himself and seemed determined not to return to Carlisle. I asked him to write and ascertain from Mr. Friedman, who was in charge of the school at the time I requested him to write, if he cared to give him a formal release from returning to Carlisle, stating that if this could be obtained, I would permit him to use his timber funds.

In the light of your letter of March 5th, I request that if it will not impair the discipline of the school that he be released from returning to Carlisle in view of the fact that I wish him to use a portion of his funds in improving some of the land. How-

er, if you insist upon him returning to Carlisle as a matter of discipline, I will give you such support as I can.

In this connection I must also state that a boy who deserted from Carlisle, as Dominick Bresette has, could certainly not be given a chance in preference to others who have ~~not~~ not left so unfavorable a record behind them."




Dear Sir:-

Dominick Bresette, one of the young men who ran away from Carlisle, and whom I telegraphed about the other day, is now in the office. He states that he likes Carlisle and it seems from his conversation that he would probably not have run away if his clothing, that is his personal clothing, had not been stolen. The young man accuses two boys in particular; Simon Soulier and John Gokee, who he believes made way with his new clothing. He states that when he would get any money from this office for the purchase of new clothing that soon after the purchase was made his clothing would be missing. This seems to have angered him so that he decided to run away, or at least this is the idea I get from my conversation with him. He says that John Gokee took his sweater and that one of the home party boys stole his suit; by this he means the boys whose time is up and who have returned to their homes. 


