SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or with-

out the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

J. L. Duncan, Carlisle Sopho-more and Football Player, Puts in Vacation as Second Chef on Diner.

### OWNS VALUABLE FARM LAND IN SOUTH DAKOTA

Intends to Till Soil When He Finishes Course at Big Government School-Has Emergency Occupation.

TACOMA, Wednesday, July 2.—If railroad dining car menu cards bore the names of the chefs, with brief biographies here is what would appear on the bills of fare of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul's transcontinental train, the Olympian, which left for the East yesterday:

"Second chef—J. L. Duncan, Sioux Indian; sophomore in Carlisle School, substitute tackle on last season's variety football team, college friend of the famous Jim Thorpe; home address, Thunderhawk, S. D., property interests, 150 acres of fine farming land in South Dakota; furnere life work, farming; emergency occupation, sign painter; cuts fine figure on ballroom, floor, nifty dresser, interesting conversationalist; more than six feet tall and of wiry, athletic physique."

A lot more could be added. Duncan is the first and only Sioux ever to preside at the range of a railroad dining car. He is now completing his first round trip in the dining car kitchen, and, as he likes the work, will stock to the job during the summer vacation. In the fall he will return to Carlisle, where he is slated for varsity tackle next football season.

To Cook Buring Summer.

Duncan left Carlisle at the end of

where he is stated for talling with the college year a forthight ago. Like many other college boys, he puts in his vacation earning money to help tide him through the period of study and football. The husky young Sioux reached Chicago and looked around to see what he could lay his hand to. He bumped into the job of third cook, or dishwasher on the Olympian and grabbed it. This was a week ago. The second day out from Chicago he was promoted to second chef—not second cook. The second chef really cooks and therefore is entitled to the more dignified title.

Duncan earned the promotion by giving strict attention to business. It was the first time he ever had toyed with the cullinary art to any extent, but he made good from the jump-off. According to the chief chef, the big Sioux has the making of a cullinary artist.

"It's a great experience," said the


