INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without special permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

My Friend:

Referring to your letter of October 23, 1913, to the Superintendent of the Carlisle School, asking for your individual Indian money, you are informed that on October 31, authority was granted him to approve your check for \$25 for personal needs and he was told that other expenditures would be considered later.

Your letter urges payment of all your money so you can buy some land. It is a worthy ambition for any young man to own a little place, a home of his own, and it is especially creditable to you because you have earned all your money under the outing system at Carlisle.

The delay in paying you your money is not due to any desire on the part of the Office to deny you the use of your funds, but rather because it is very anxious that you shall make no mistake in its expenditure but that you shall use it to the very best possible advantage.

The Office does not know where you propose to buy, nor how much land you can get for your money. Judging

from your balance it is believed that you have hardly enough cash yet to purchase a place. If you find you have not enough now it would seem to be a good plan to leave all your money with Superintendent Friedman, where it will be safe and at interest, and go to work and earn more, saving as much as possible all the time till you have enough for a home. From your faithful work in the past and the nice balance you have now, I should have no doubt that you would surely win out in the end.

Your last letter asks on the first page for all your money with which to buy a place, and on the second page you say you cannot earn money enough to buy land or a house and lot. Under the circumstances it is certainly not advisable to pay you all your money, but rather to wait until you can give the Office a definite idea of what you propose to do. Your requests for money should be submitted to Superintendent Friedman at Carlisle.


Sir:



Dear friend John:

Your post card of the 17th instant, regarding your money held here, just received and in reply will say that I am unable to give you any further information than has already been given to you by Mr. Friedman and the Indian Office. I have looked over the correspondence with you very carefully and find that they have told you all that there is to tell you about your money.

Rules and regulations governing Indian moneys are such that certain forms must be used before the Indians can get their money. The makers of those Rules are responsible for the difficulty you are having to get your money. Mr. Friedman is not responsible, and if you continue to accuse him of keeping your money away from you, you will get yourself into trouble. You had better be careful how you accuse people. You may be called upon to prove it.

Since you have already been informed by the Indian Office and Mr. Friedman why your money cannot be sent to you right away, the only thing for you to do is to be patient and wait until such time as the Office sees fit to send you your money. When they get around to it they will change the Rules so that moneys can be distributed without so much "Red Tape." In the meantime I would suggest that you stop writing to everybody that you know, and save your money to live on instead of buying stamps. The whole matter has been explained to you and we will begin to think that something is the matter with your head if you do not understand yet. Your money is all right and drawing interest, and you'll not lose it. I am sure that in due time your money will be sent to you. Just have a little patience.
