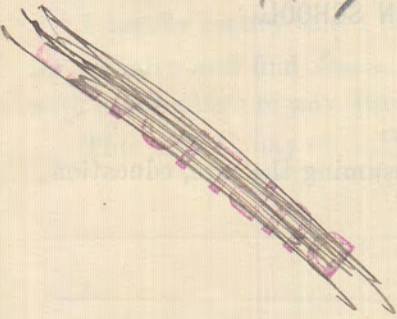

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school shall be furnished with the original of this form for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the office of the superintendent in charge of the reservation. The Reservation Superintendent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

My dear Madam:

Soon after the arrival here of your grandson, Isaac Wilson, he deserted from this school, and in spite of all our efforts to find him he was not brought back to school until the 10th of this month. He was exposed to the weather during his absence and lived on what little he could beg, so he is now in too weakened a condition to continue with his school work.

In accordance with our physicians' recommendations it is being arranged to send him home. He will leave here this evening and transportation for his passage is being provided. He should not have any difficulty in making the trip to Mahanomen and he has assured me that he can reach home from there.

My dear Sir:

This reply to your letter of October the 7th has been so long delayed because at the time it was received here Isaac Wilson had just been brought back to school and our School Physicians had not yet made their examination into his condition. He and William Little Wolf had run away from school on September the 8th and our search for him had been without result. We finally located the boys near Harrisburg, where they had lived in the open during the greater part of the time they were absent from this school.

As it has been found that Isaac is suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis, and because his condition seems to have become greatly weakened by his exposure and scant living, it has been recommended that he be sent home. In accordance with our physicians' recommendation it is being


