Dear Sir:

Under date of May 12th, 1913, I wrote to Mr. Geo. Vest, a pupil of your school, in your care, that I was willing that he spend his vacation here among his home people, provided that he made satisfactory arrangements with you for leave of absence and complied with your rules. This letter was recently returned here by George Vest, and my attention called to the note at the bottom as follows:

"George:

In view of the fact that similar requests from other students are being refused, there seems to be no reason why you should be given permission to spend the summer months at your home.

This note seems to be inconsistent with your letter of May 20th, 1913, in which you advise me that in accordance with my recommendation, it has been decided to grant Joseph Lombard permission to return to his home at the close of this school year in June. You add that "however, Joseph has but \$25 to his credit in our school bank, and an amount to cover his return fare from Carlisle to Pawhuska will have to be deposited with me before the desired arrangements can



I cannot understand why permission to return home should be granted in one case and refused in the other, the circumstances and conditions being presumably alike. If you have a fixed and definite policy which you follow in connection with reuests for permission to spend part of the vacation time at home, I would be glad to know, so that applicants from your school may be properly advised.

I have recently talked over the matter of sending the required deposit to cover the return transportation of Joseph Lombard, with Mr. Fox, Joseph's stepfather, and have learned that Mr. Fox is very strongly of the opinion that it would be better for Joseph to remain at your school until about August 1st, ~~and~~ coming here for only a month's vacation at that time. Joseph's two brothers, Sylvester and George Lombard (or Dick Turpin) have recently received several hundred dollars each, and Mr. Fox says that they are not using the money to good advantage. He fears that if Joseph came here for a two or three months visit, the brothers might lead him into bad habits. Mr. Fox believes that he and his wife, (Joseph's mother), can ward off evil influences for a month after August 1st, as the two brothers will not be likely to have much money left by that time. Mr. Fox expects to send the funds for Joseph's transportation, in your care, in the latter part of July, if not sooner.

Dear Sir:

Referring to your letter of June 17th, regarding the granting of summer vacations to students enrolled here from your jurisdiction, I will advise that a favor granted Joseph Lombard was refused George Vest for the reason that the latter was enrolled here for a definite period of enrolment after transportation had been provided for him from government funds. The former was enrolled after he had provided the funds necessary to pay for his transportation, and, in accordance with the policy that has generally been followed at this school, it is believed that he is not under the same obligations as George is to remain for a definite period of enrolment. While this ruling is one that is generally followed, special consideration is given requests if the circumstances are such as to warrant special action.

Mr. Fox has deposited a sufficient amount to

pay for Joseph's transportation home and with which transportation can be placed for his return to school at the termination of the period of leave. It has also been requested by Mr. Fox that Joseph be given permission to come only for the month of August, and such arrangements will be made.

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school shall be furnished with the original of this form for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the office of the superintendent in charge of the reservation. The Reservation Superintendent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer. 6-870

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.
