However, I have written to Roy at Altoona, Pennsylvania, where he was employed after he left Carlisle, and just as soon as I hear from him I will report to you again.

Louis Headley, who is enrolled here from the Shoshone Agency, has had considerable trouble with his eyes and is now confined to a Philadelphia Hospital where he is receiving special care and attention. It cannot be determined at this time just when it will be advisable to let Louis come to his home because I am anxious that everything possible shall be done for him before he returns to his home where he may not get the necessary treatment that is needed.



My dear Sir:

Referring to your letter of June 17 & 24, 1914, regarding the release of Roy Large, since the time your letter of July the 1st was received here I have learned that Roy Large had come to this school on the evening before the 4th of July in what was evidently an intoxicated condition. About four o'clock on the morning of the 4th

he was engaged in a fight with another fellow who had come to Carlisle with him, and as near as it can be determined he must have left again before sunrise.

Under the circumstances I do not feel justified in asking the authority to pay for his transportation as is recommended in your letter until I hear again from Roy and until I can be assured that he has made any effort at all to use rightly the money he has earned since he was given permission to leave this school.


Referring to your letters of June 17 & 24, 1914, regarding the return of Roy Large, you are advised that, if possible, Roy should be returned to this reservation at Government expense. His parents are practically without funds, his mother having \$22.00 land sale money deposited to her credit and his step-father, Valentine Cody, \$87.00 from an inherited estate.

Roy's parents have been working well this spring plowing some of their allotted lands and placing them in cultivation, but owing to late frosts it is doubtful what their crops will be. Valentine has a four horse team of Indian ponies, a wagon and harness, no other stock.

It is recommended that the matter be placed before the Honorable Commissioner as suggested in your letter of June 24th, with a view to having Roy returned home at Government expense.

In this connection attention is invited to the fact that Dr. Dewey will return to the reservation about August 1, 1914, and Roy will receive the best of attention for his eyes after that date.
