SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

At the request of David Iron Elk I am writing you that David will leave here tomorrow evening for his home. Transportation for his passage to Rushville will be provided for his use and he will have a sufficient amount in cash with which to pay for his incidental expenses enroute and the stage fare from Rushville to your School or to his home.

I would thank you to notify the father of the boy if it is convenient for you to do so.

David has not been very strong for some time and it is believed best that he should be allowed to go home where he will not be as closely confined as is necessary here. It is to be regretted that his physical condition has become so weakened because he is unusually ambitious and has been a splendid boy in every way while here. He is now in condition to make the trip home and whatever can be done for the boy should be done.

There is submitted below for your information a copy of a report and recommendation that was addressed to me on the 18th instant by our School Physician:

"The following patients, all of which are tubercular, I recommend to be sent home as soon as arrangements can be made: (Three other names are listed with David Iron Elk's. OHL.) All these children are now in excellent condition, having had weeks of treatment. They are in fact to be considered as having recovered so that I can hardly recommend them for sanitarium treatment. In case the home conditions of any of these children are very unsatisfactory that child may be retained, but otherwise I consider the confinement and strain of school life undesirable."

David's period of enrolment would terminate at the close of school in June, but because his health is now in such improved condition I would thank you to advise me at once whether you approve of his being sent home as soon as arrangements to do so can be completed.
