SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school shall be furnished with the original of this form for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the office of the superintendent in charge of the reservation. The Reservation Superintendent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer. 6-870

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

I have any objections to his enrolment here, kindly sign the certificate and return same to me, as the boy's enrolment is withheld pending receipt of your approval."

I thank you for the information you conveyed to me in your letter of December the 9th relative to the John Razor who is now enrolled at the Pipestone School, because I believe that all Superintendents of schools and agencies should co-operate in keeping out of the schools those young fellows who are anxious only to have a comfortable place to spend the colder winter months. However, I find that I gave my consent to the enrolment at Pipestone of the young man referred to.

During the absence from school early in October of the clerk who generally handles matters of enrolment I waived objections to John's remaining at Pipestone, being under the impression at the time that he was one of the boys who had been given permission to go home on leave and not knowing then that he deserted from Carlisle after he had been enrolled but a little less than four months.

I submit below copies of Superintendent Mann's letter to me and my reply, respectively. The former is dated September 30th and my reply October the 3rd.

My dear Mr. Lipps:-

With the risk of your thinking that I am butting into something that is none of my business, I am writing you relative to John Razor, who ran away from your school last spring. After Razor ran away, he came West and was here a few days in this vicinity, stopping at the school once or twice. I informed him that so long as he was a runaway that I would not under any circumstances harbor him. He left going south, where he played ball this summer with some teams in Nebraska and Kansas, coming back about a month ago. He went to Pipestone where he was accepted as a pupil, and I understand has been made Major of the battalion. He was here a few days ago, and seems to be gloring in the fact that Carlisle could not do anything with him, and possess as a brilliant example of what he, or anybody else can do if they work it right. He told the boys of his experiences in running away, and how nearly he came to be captured in Pittsburg and one or two other places.

Now, I do not know whether Mr. Mann has taken up the matter with the Office and has secured consent to enroll the young fellow or not, as he is past 21 years of age. At all events, I think his presence here at Pipestone is demoralizing the discipline of all schools, and that Pipestone School should be required to dismiss him at once.

I do not like to have my name appear connected with ^{the} matter, but if you will observe the publication of the Peace Pipe, there, you will see that he is, or has been carried a member of the school foot ball team, and is an officer at the school.

Both Flandreau and Pipestone have refused applications from a great many desirable pupils this fall, and it does not seem right that they should be excluded and another runaway accepted simply because he is a desirable foot ball player.

Trusting that you will appreciate the situation, and that some action may be taken, I am






