SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

The enrollment of Indian pupils in nonreservation schools is governed by the "Rules for the Indian Service, 1913," sections 12, 13, 14, 15, 18, 19, 36, 112, 113, 114, 117, 118, 124 (b).

The Rules should be consulted before filling out the application blanks.

My dear Mr. Brown:

I submit below for your information a copy of a recommendation and report that was submitted to me on the 18th instant by our School Physician:

"The following patients, all of which are tubercular, I recommend to be sent home as soon as arrangements can be made: (Three other names besides Edward Sockey's name were listed. OHL.) All these children are now in excellent condition, having had weeks of treatment. They are in fact to be considered as having recovered so that I can hardly recommend them for sanatorium treatment. In case the home conditions of any of these children are very unsatisfactory that child may be retained, but otherwise I consider the confinement and strain of school life undesirable."

In view of the fact that Edward's health is now in such improved condition I would thank you to advise me whether his return home shall be effected and whether the amount ~~xx~~ required to pay for his transportation can be provided from his own funds.

My dear Sir:

When your letter of the 3rd instant was received here thru the office of Supervisor Brown at Muskogee, requesting that Edward Sockey be kept at Carlisle because you have no suitable place to keep him, it was referred to our School Physician for his information. I have just received a statement in reply thereto and I submit a copy of it below:

Very respectfully.

"I do not consider this school a fit, permanent residence for a consumptive. Edward Sockey is in good present condition, it is true, but it is possible that his trouble will reassert itself at some future time. I cannot recommend him to a sanatorium without stating the fact that in his present condition he will usurp the place of a patient who will probably stand in greater need of treatment. Therefore, I recommended him to go home. If that home has no place for him I take it that Sockey will probably have to be retained or an effort made to place him in a sanatorium."

Although I must agree with the Doctor that Edward may have to be retained here if you cannot take care of him, I must also state that this is no place for a boy who is afflicted as Edward is. Other students, able bodied

and of an age when they will have but a year or two more to spend in school, had to be denied entrance here because those less desirable, like Edward in so far as his physical condition is concerned, had already been admitted. The fact that you do not seem to have a suitable place to keep him is no reason why some one else should have to be deprived of getting an education because of a lack of room here. It is my opinion that the government should not be expected to care for Edward, especially not in a school like Carlisle.

If there is any way by which you can co-operate in having Edward taken away from Carlisle and cared elsewhere I would like to hear from you.
